

Three Horses Take New Marks In Keen Racing At Ch'town Saturday

Three new marks were established Saturday night at the Charlottetown Driving Park racing meet as Whispering Hope, Sleepy Sam and Arionway won dashes in record-breaking time.

Whispering Hope, the strong bay gelding driven by Cyril Smith and owned by A. Weeks of Fredericton, paced a mile in 2:13 3/5 as he won the second dash of the DeBlouis Bros. Classified Race.

Sleepy Sam came under the wire in 2:15 3/5 to better his mark by one-fifth of a second, while Arionway won the last heat of the Classified Trot in 2:16 4/5. Arionway's old mark was 2:17 3/5.

Other winners on the night's card were Follow Up Jr. in the first and fifth dashes, My Darling, Royal Scott Jr. and Lassie Lucille.

Whispering Hope moved up from fourth position at the three-quarter pole in setting his new record. He passed Money Royal, Dale B. and Billy Budlong as he headed into the stretch and beat off a strong challenge by the Dave Wisener-driven My Darling.

The Wisener-driven mare won the first dash of this event after getting away to a slow start. My Darling started far behind the rest of the field and paced nearly three quarters of the mile in seventh position before passing the pack and winning the honors in a great race with Whispering Hope.

Sleepy Sam's great performance in the second race was almost overshadowed by an accident on the upper turn in which Mid Goguen was thrown off his sulky. Goguen, who was driving Surprise Lady, landed on the fence but was not seriously injured and was able to drive in the next race.

The young Quebec driver was not at fault for the accident in which Captain Missouri and Eva Budlong were also unavoidably involved.

Lucky Number, driven by James McGregor, was disqualified for interference at the location of the accident and McGregor was taken down for the remainder of the card.

Follow Up Jr. won the first and fifth dashes. Owner Ralph MacFadyen drove the gelding and led from wire to wire in both events. Sea Plant finished second in the first race and Sister Verna in the fifth.

Len O'Meara took Royal Scott Jr. up from seventh place at the five eighths turn to win the fourth dash. Royal Scott Jr., Arionway and Waymark trotted neck and neck down the stretch with Arionway nosing out Waymark for second place.

Arionway won the eighth dash following another stretch duel with Royal Scott Jr. Joandale, driven by E. Bernard, was third.

Col. D. A. MacKinnon drove Lassie Lucille to victory in the sixth dash. The Colonel took Lassie away in front and stayed on top from wire to wire. Sleepy

Sam, driven by Joe Hennessey, moved up fast from sixth place to finish a close second.

The daily double on Sleepy Sam and My Darling paid \$17.70. The quinnella paid \$53.50.

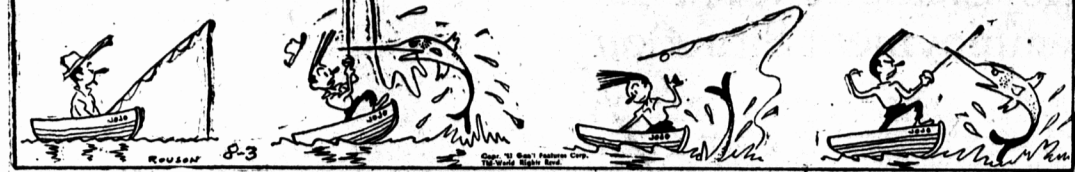

Red Sox Stunned By Four Losses To Detroit

(By The Canadian Press)

Last week the Boston Red Sox were surging, and starting to talk pennant.

Sunday night they sat stunned by four straight losses to Detroit Tigers, a team which has kicked the Red Sox out of the American League cellar most of the season.

The Tigers made a clean sweep of their four-game series with the Sox at Boston, winning both ends of a Sunday doubleheader. They rallied to cop the nightcap 9-6 after righthander Ned Garver bested Boston 2-1 in the opener.

The skidding Sox now have lost eight straight since their successful road trip when they climbed to third place. Now they're 4 1/2 games back of Cleveland Indians, who recaptured the third spot.

The Indians took both games of Sunday's doubleheader at Philadelphia against the Athletics. Early Wynn and Bob Lemon won the games, 10-1 and 7-1.

The second-place Chicago White Sox lost a tight shutout to Washington 1-0 in a single game. They remained five games behind New York Yankees, whose doubleheader with St. Louis Browns was rained out.

In the National League, Milwaukee Braves trimmed Brooklyn's league-leading margin to 7 1/2 games to set the stage for a Braves-Dodger series opening at Milwaukee today.

Joe Adcock blasted a 3-2 pitch by reliever Karl Drews into the bleachers with two on in the eighth to win the second game over Philadelphia Phillies, 6-1. The Sox took the opener 4-1.

St. Louis Cardinals, defeated six straight times by Brooklyn, drubbed the Dodgers 10-1 in two alling Redbirds, Red Schoendienst and Steve Bilko, swung powerful bats to back the sharp six-hit pitching of Harvey Haddix.

Cincinnati's two most effective pitchers—Harry Perkowski and Fred Baczewski—stuffed New York Giants 5-1 and 3-1 as the Redlegs swept the doubleheader at Cincinnati.

Ransom Jackson's 11th-inning homer off Murry Dickson gave Chicago Cubs a 7-6 decision over Pittsburgh Pirates. The second game was called because of approaching darkness and will be replayed Sept. 9.

In the American League Saturday, St. Louis defeated the Yankees 3-2 on a three-run homer by Don Lenhardt off Bob Kuzava in the eighth. Bob Feller, pitching Cleveland to a 5-2 win over Philadelphia, had a shutout until the ninth when Loren Babe doubled and Gus Gerniat hit his 24th home run. Detroit overcame a 3-0 deficit to defeat Boston 4-3 in 10 innings on Harvey Keenn's double.

The White Sox defeated Washington 4-0 as Connie Johnson, 31-year-old Negro rookie righthander, checked the Senators with eight hits and fanned 10.

In the National League, Milwaukee's Warren Spahn turned in a 5-0 shutout over Philadelphia. Spahn missed a perfect game when Richie Ashburn beat out an infield grounder to become the only Phillie base-runner. The shutout was Spahn's second of the week. Cincinnati and New York battled 13 innings before Andy Seminick rapped a single with two out and the bases loaded in the last of the 13th for a 10-9 win over the

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—New Brunswick plans to lay claim to the Canadian junior women's broad jump record on a basis of a track meet here Saturday to select members of a team to represent the province at the two-day interprovincial track meet at Toronto next month at St. John's.

The claim will be based on the performance of a rangy, tow-headed Fredericton miss, 16-year-old Marjorie Squires, who twice bettered the record of 16 feet, 11 1/2 inches set at St. Lambert, Que. June 27 by Toronto's Carol Smith.

The Fredericton high school student's first jump was 17 feet, 2 1/2 inches. In the second she made only 15 feet 10 1/4 inches on a bad takeoff. Her third jump was 17 feet, 3 3/4 inches.

Spring-legged Miss Squire has other talents, too. She won the high jump at four feet, four and three-quarters inches when other contestants dropped out; she won the 60-yard dash at 7.5 and the 100-yard dash at 11.9. A 220-yard dash in 26.1 second was disallowed when it was found the course was improperly measured.
