### TASTY SANDWICHES

One inexpensive sandwich filling combines chopped hard boiled egg, ground wenger, ground raw carrot, onion juice to taste and mayonnaise. Double decker sandwiches are great for variety. Combine two slices of white and one of brown bread or vice versa and fill with some of the following combinations: Egg salad and mashed sardines with lemon juice and salad dressing. Chicken or turkey salad and finely chopped cabbage and grated raw carrot and onion with just enough salad dressing to moisten. Ham salad and sliced hard boiled egg, sliced sweet pickle and mayonnaise. Egg salad and tuna fish with celery mixed with mayonnaise. Egg salad and mashed nippy cheese and chopped nuts mixed with mayonnaise. Lunches can be dreamed up for all occasions. Here is the "Batchelor or birthday special": chicken-lacking in a vacuum jar packed piping hot, buttered, corn muffins, carrots and celery sticks, coleslaw and drained canned peas rolled in white or colored coconut.
