News Notes.

The Swedish government has negotiated a loan of forty million crowns. There is great excitement and alarm at Havana owing to two attempts at dynamiting and incendiary fire which caused \$200,000 loss.

It is stated that the Emperor of Germany has resolved to introduce a complete system of physical culture in addition to mental training in the German system of education.

There is considerable excitement in imperial parliamentary circles over an allegation by Mr. Chamberlain that the Gladstonians have made a compact with the Parnellites to the prejudice of undenominational education.

The British Columbia Legislature is moving vigorously in the matter of developing the mining resources of the Kootenay district. The Kootenay smelting and trading syndicate have erected immense works at Revelstoke, and will begin operations the coming summer. The Revelstoke Mining Company also intend pushing forward their operations, and the C. P. R. expect shortly to commence the construction of a railway line to connect with steamers from the works. English capitalists are at the back of the mining projects, and a genuine boom is expected.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.

The House went into Committee of Supply, and the greater part of the afternoon was spent in criticizing the amount of pensions paid to the family of Sergeant Vaquette, of the 65th Batt., killed in the Northwest in 1885, and to Sergeant F. Hurrell, of the 90th, who contracted rheumatism in the same service. Hurrell himself was in the public gallery and three times interrupted the discussion ere the Sergeant-at-Arms was instructed to eject him.

After recess, the Orange incorporation bill was considered, and agreed to in committee.

When it was reported, Mr. Barren moved that it be re-committed, with instructions to insert a clause forbidding the association to hold processions in provinces where party procession acts have been, or may be, enacted. This resolution was still under discussion when the hour for private bills expired, and the House again went into committee of supply.

The discussion on the Orange Bill was not finished to-night, but an agreement has been arrived at that it will be up for discussion again in the first order of the day for Monday last.

Pictou Wins.

PICTOU, Feb. 28.

Pictou won the Halifax Cup, yesterday, by defeating the Thistles in this city. This cup, it will be remembered, was offered for the championship of last season's bonspiel, and the clubs, owing to soft weather, were unable to complete the series of games for it. On the clubs in the two provinces playing off for it, the contest finally settled down to the Thistle and Pictou clubs, while the home club was defeated. The contest was a close and exciting one. At the close of the game the two clubs were tied, and following out the rule, the different rinks played another end, and still the game was a tie. The 20th end settled the Thistles, the Pictou men securing two of a lead. Score—Pictou 45; Thistles 43.

A Newspaper Fined.

TORONTO, Feb. 28.

The World newspaper has been fined \$20 and costs for publishing the Louisiana State Lotteries advertisement. Adams, the advertiser, was let out on his own bail. The proprietor of the World stated that he knew nothing of the advertisement before it was put in his paper.

Probably not True.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.

Some Canadian papers to-day published a despatch from London stating that Sir Charles Tupper was about to sail for this country to take part in the Paumotu-Blaine fishery negotiations. The highest authorities here have no knowledge of any such intention on the part of the High Commissioner.

The Curling Match with granite stones for the Governor-General's prize was played to-day between the Walkerton and Winnipeg Clubs, and resulted in an easy victory for the latter Club. The score was 22 to 44.
