 "Salad Days" was added to the repertoire of the Shaw Festival last night and considering that the musical-comedy had been under rehearsal for only nine days the production was quite delightful.

There was nothing about the program that could not be cur-

ed by a little more practice. Once all the lines are learned and the dance steps perfected, this should be very pleasing entertainment.

For regular festival goers it may seem strange to see the familiar faces in such new and different roles, but the Shaw

Festival actors seem to thrive on the new environment. Even with opening night just passed it is obvious that there will be several roles that will shine in this production.

Douglas C. Wright is a natural in all of the five different roles he plays. The scene in it is a beauty parlor with Janet Coffin as one of the highlights of the night. Miss Coffin also delighted the audience with her second role as a night club singer.

It strikes the viewer how versatile these people are. For Shaw's works they have a new moved into song and dance routines.

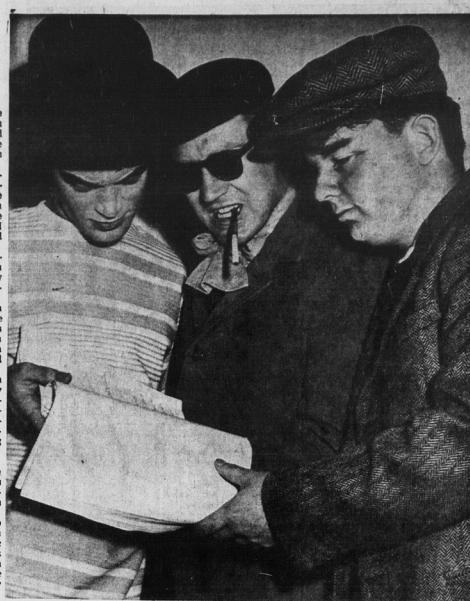
The story is built around a magic piano which makes people want to dance and the happiness and problems it brings to a young couple. It is a production that can and should be enjoyed by the whole family.

Old Bridge Span Goes To Bottom

Removing the old Hillboro Bridge is proving a more difficult job than may have been thought at first.

The span which has been the object of several attempts to remove by barge in the last few weeks, is resting on the bottom of the Hillboro River at the present time.

The barges succeeded in raising the steel span yesterday from its resting place on the

stone piers but the whole load proved topheavy and the barges dropped it on the river bottom, part way up shore.

The wooden pilings which had been erected on the decks of the steel spans to boost the bridge span at high tide were scattered around the harbor after the span upset.

Whether the span can now be winched ashore is the problem now facing the contractors.

Souris Amends Dump Blaw; Offers Reward

SOURIS—The Souris Town Council has decreed that there be no further dumping of potatoes or animal carcasses on the town dump. And it also declares that the town dump is for the use of residents of the town only.

The bylaw pertaining to the dump was amended at a meeting of the council Monday night to give effect to this policy.

It was also decided to enforce these amendments by offering a \$25 reward to anyone offering information on any infractions of the bylaw.

The council also decided to repeal the town's cement mixer and to discontinue its policy of

allowing private contractors or firms or individuals to test it. A list of rules were drawn up by the council for the guidance of town employees and the council was informed by the clerk that the list of delinquent taxpayers was nearly complete and as soon as it is completed will be published. The same thing also applies to delinquent water taxpayers.

Mayor E. LaVie presided and Councillors Elmer Doucette, Clarence MacDonald, Andrew McCreary, Walter Solomon and John J. MacDonald were present. Coun. Ray Leard is on vacation and is not present.

Government Building Project To Get Underway May 1964

May of 1964 is the target date for beginning construction of the provincial government's new office building in Charlottetown. The announcement was made by Hon. J.J. Stewart, provincial secretary yesterday.

The multi-million dollar project will be carried out by the department of public works. This will result in the saving of federal sales tax on building materials.

Mr. Stewart said that one of the advantages of beginning construction next May is that it will extend the construction boom in the Charlottetown area.

"It is felt," he said, "that the workload in the area should be spread out rather than completed all in one year. About the time the Confederation Memor-

ial Building is completed we will be swinging into construction of our new office building."

Druggists Reminded Of Threat

WINNIPEG (CP)—The head of a Canadian drug store chain says pharmacists should be aware of the threat posed by discount stores.

P. W. Goldman of Toronto, president of Plaza Drug Stores Limited, told delegates to the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association's annual convention Monday the number of discount stores in Canada total 100 this year.

Many drug stores and department stores find the going tough and close their doors, he said. Hardier types maintained their volume but sacrificed one or two per cent in profit.

Mr. Goldman said discounters are running into stiffer competition from established stores.

"Their natural appeal is being neutralized on every corner . . . discount stores are compelled to offer credit cards and more service. Profit margins are tending to shrink. When these shrink, losses are not far away."

Riders Cancel Import Plans

OTTAWA (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders have called off plans to import a couple of new import halfbacks into the lineup for their Eastern Football Conference game with Montreal Alouettes here Thursday night.

One of them, Bob Yackelick, headed back for the United States Tuesday after informing coach Frank Clair that he had decided to take another year of university. He is a former Rutgers University star who played with Chicago Bears before Riders signed him.

Joe Taylor, a cut from New York Giants, was thought to be headed for a spot in Thursday's contest but Clair Tuesday said Taylor is "not hot green."

"He's got a lot to learn and it would be better to give him another week of work with us before putting him into action."

Biggest Race Ever Says Cote

ST. HYACINTHE, Que. (CP) Gerard Cote, four-time winner of the Boston Marathon, said Tuesday the field for the Sept. 1 Canadian Marathon championship here shapes up as "the biggest and the best ever."

Cote, one of the organizers of the event, said he anticipates 65 to 70 entries half from Canada and half from the United States.

The 26-mile, 350-yard run is listed officially as the national championship of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

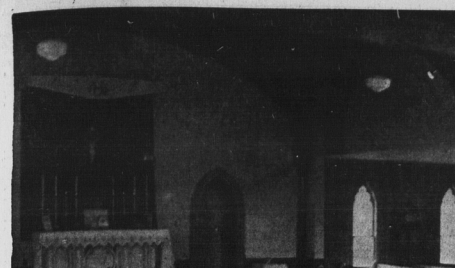
A six-mile course was being prepared and the finish line will be at city hall in this community 25 miles east of Montreal.

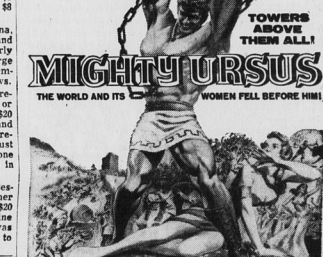
