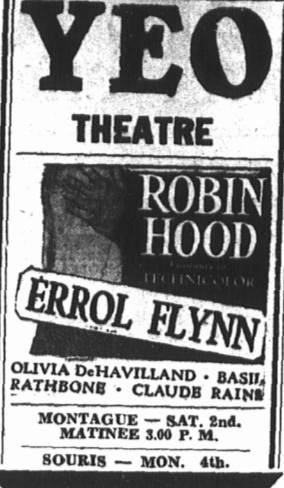

Platinum Fox Brings More Alive Than Dead

RARE SPECIES SELLS FOR \$7,500, SKINS ARE WORTH \$1,500 BALTIMORE (AP)—That fur-bearing economic animal, the platinum fox, is a joy to breeders who sell his fur for \$1,500, but it's a puzzle to geneticists. Platinum foxes made headlines when the Duchess of Windsor wore one of the few platinum furs in the world. Otto L. Mohr and Per Tuor of Oslo run up what science knows of these foxes in the current issue of the Journal of Heredity. Platinum foxes, the first recorded platinum fox, was born in 1933 in Norway, one of six pups whose parents were ordinary silver foxes imported from Canada. Mohr was lighter than ordinary silver foxes and had white markings on nose and body. His unusual coloring made him too valuable to kill for fur, and few of his descendants have been killed. Dead, their skins would bring \$1,500, but alive, a pair is worth \$7,500. There are fewer than 30 platinum foxes in the world. As for genetics: Platinum foxes don't breed according to scientific laws. Platinum parents average two platinum pups for every silver fox pup. Under Mendel's law the ratio should be three-to-one. The authors say that platinum genes, which carry characteristics between parent and offspring, sometimes kill the embryo. Another problem is why some platinum foxes are lighter than others. It is because the genes are different, or is their action modified by factors such as those that produce
