Royal Life Saving Tests Conducted — Royal Life Saving Tests were conducted in Summerside on three different days during the past week. Mrs. Earl Taylor, Examiner for the Royal Life Saving Society administered the tests for the different awards. This Society's highest award, the Diploma, is granted only to those who perform the difficult water test and in addition complete a three hour written test on the theory of swimming and life saving. Those making over seventy-five percent in each item of the test receive a gold medal. Last year there were nine Canadian candidates for this distinction but none were successful in the written test. Wednesday morning Mr. Ralph Emery of Summerside completed the sea water test for this award and received very high marks which entitle him to the Gold Medal in the performance test. Mr. Emery will write the theoretical test the first Saturday in October which is the permanent date for this test in all parts of the British Empire. Mrs. Taylor was the official representative of the Royal Life Saving Society at the Y's Men's Banquet which followed the Provincial Swimming Meet in Summerside on Labour Day. She spoke briefly on the work carried out by that society and presented interim certificates. Two Local Men Escape In Fall At Summerside

Two Charlottetown men, John Milne and Maurice Doyle, employees of the County Construction Company escaped serious injury at Summerside yesterday afternoon when the rope scaffolding on which they were working broke, and both fell a distance of 15 to 18 feet to the concrete sidewalk below. They had been engaged during the day in pointing the bricks on the front of the Island Telephone Building at Summerside and about five o'clock had come down about half way when the accident occurred. Both were for a time rendered unconscious and were taken to the Prince County Hospital after Dr. E. F. Tanton had been hurriedly called to the scene. Dr. Tanton said last night that neither had sustained any serious injury, as far as it was then known, although x-rays would be taken this morning. Mr. Milne was suffering from an injured hip, abrasions on the hands and shock. Mr. Doyle sustained a broken knee cap and was also being treated for shock. Both were reported resting fairly comfortably last night.—S

Most fortunate of the P. E. I. members in respect of public buildings is J. Watson MacNaught, parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayhew who returned from Summerside to Ottawa this afternoon.

Whether it was by good luck or good management, Mr. MacNaught succeeded in the selection of an excellent site for the Summerside building without delay, had the contract signed and now has construction work well advanced.

Today and tomorrow, Treasury Board, together with experts from Public Works, Transport and other Departments involved in building programs is listing all projects now under way or for which funds have been voted by Parliament. Using this list it will pare down the non-essential buildings by many millions.

DEBATE ON Continued from page 1 sympathy with the desire to eliminate war profiteering. He could see no reason for profits in the production of any instrument made strictly for war purposes.

The trouble with the C. C. F. motion, he said, was that use of the words "munitions and arms" meant that it would embrace factories producing war as well as new war goods and there was no way of differentiating.

Solon Low, Social Credit leader, said every effort should be made to take profiteering out of war production but experience had shown that even when the Government went into that field it often had to call on private firms to do the job. It should be possible without nationalization to limit profits. The real profiteers were "those fellows who manipulated the international exchanges and manoeuvre countries into war."

The Cheapest Way J. L. Gibson (Ind-Coxox-Alberni) said the cheapest way to produce arms or anything else was to give a private individual an incentive to earn. The Government would take care of any excess profits. There was a difference between profits and profiteering.

Trade Minister Howe asked the C. C. F. to name any profiteers in arms in the last war.

Chris Gillis (C.C.F.) said studies of the balance sheets of many companies would supply the answer. He mentioned the Massey-Harris Company, International Nickel, the steel companies of Canada. The Aluminium Company of Canada was another that, he said, "made a lot of money."

Perhaps nationalization was not the right method to curb profiteering in wartime. But some system should be adopted by which the Government could say that in the manufacture of planes and guns and bombs and other types of military equipment, no undue profits were to be made.

To Hold First Conference Of P.E.I. Film Councils

The Visual Education branch of the Department of Education plans to hold the first conference of the Prince Edward Island Film Councils in Summerside on Tuesday, September 26th.

Approximately 50 representatives are expected to attend from the eight councils now functioning in this Province. The conference will consist of morning, afternoon and evening sessions, and will be led by Mr. Charles Topsee of the Adult Education Branch of the Nova Scotia Department of Education.

Mr. Topsee is considered to be an expert in the field of discussion technique, and will demonstrate the most satisfactory methods of leading discussion groups in rural communities. In addition to the discussion periods to be held, the meeting will deal with the utilization of documentary films for community purposes, the supply of films, and the training of projectionists.

The film councils spread throughout the Province consist of representatives of rural groups which have procured their own equipment for the showing of documentary and educational films supplied by the National Film Board. These councils include the Inter-community Film Council from Crapaud, Hampton, Victoria and Tryon. The Abegweit Council from Cape Traverse, Carleton and Augustine Cove area. The South Shore Council from Central Bedeque, North Bedeque, Middleton and Sparrowtown. Traveller's Rest Council from Traveller's Rest, Wilmot Valley and Sherbrooke. Other councils include areas around Kensington, O'Leary, Alberton and Tyne Valley.

Representatives at the conference from the Charlottetown Headquarters of the National Film Board will include Braconer, Chandler, John Martin and Stan McInnis.

Nfld. Sales Tax To Go Into Effect

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Sept. 8 — (CP) — Newfoundland's first sales tax and first Provincial taxation will go into effect Nov. 1, the Finance Department announced here today. Known as the social security assessment, the three per cent tax will be charged on retail sales—with exceptions.

Goods required by producers to produce, such as lines and twines for fishermen, are exempt. All retail vendors are being licensed and will be paid three per cent of tax collected as a fee for doing so. The act does not permit tax to be absorbed into the sale price but must be paid in addition to the regular price.

PARIS, Aug. 31 — (Reuters) — The sale of 22 French magazines specializing in "pin-up" photographs was banned to persons under 18 under a decree published today. The decree instructed newsstands to keep the magazines out of sight, producing them only when asked for.

Material For Provincial Archives Being Surveyed

A move towards the establishment of a Provincial Archives is being made by the Director of Adult Education in forwarding posters and literature to the twenty-four libraries throughout Prince Edward Island.

Posters point out the value of accurate historical knowledge of this Province, and circulars stress the need for ascertaining what material is available before a central place be sought for the exhibition of archival material.

Documents, pictures, books, diaries, ledgers of accounts, newspapers, coins, stamps, glassware, pottery, jewelry, clothing, toys, photographs, weaving, furniture, cooking utensils, tools, engravings, and land deeds are only a few of the many articles pertaining to the history of P.E.I. which are being sought.

The survey is being conducted by Mr. Bramwell Chandler and Miss Frances Johnston, with offices located at the P.E.I. Libraries at Prince of Wales College. In conjunction with the survey, Miss Johnston is working on displays of Prince Edward Island history which will be circulated among the libraries together with portions of a set of 50 pictures which have been received from the National Galleries.

Canadian Council Of The Blind Ends 4-Day Convention

MONTREAL, Sept. 8 — (CP) — Mrs. Sadie Bending of London, Ont., founder of the Canadian Council of the Blind, today was unanimously re-elected president of the organization founded in 1943. Other officers re-elected were: Vice-president, H. A. Lacey, Edmonton; directors, I. L. Hunter, Gooderham, Ont.; Redmond Kelly, St. John's, Nfld.; Dr. W. Workman, New Westminster, B.C.; W. J. Cummings, Regina; and J. A. Jackson, St. Catharines, Ont.

The 100 delegates to the four-day convention which closed today voted to continue the work of a special committee on insurance for the blind and to seek reduced premiums on life insurance for the blind. Premiums for the blind are higher than those for sighted persons.

The convention decided to hold next year's convention at Halifax.
