Flyers, Royals Clash In Second Game Of CHL Finals

Its play-off hockey at the Charlotteville Forum again tonight with the Parkdale Flyers meeting the Charlotteville Royals in the second and possibly deciding game of the best-of-three City Hockey League finals. Game time is 7:30 sharp and a skate will follow.

The Flyers took the opening game of the series 8-5 on Tuesday evening and thus the Royals find themselves with their backs against the wall as far as the series is concerned and they could be ousted from further competition this evening. However, the Royals are not a team to go down without a fight, having proved themselves strong competitors as they defeated the Saints in the sudden-death semi-finals.

The Royals are expected to ice a full line-up tonight and should make it quite interesting for the powerful Flyers before the series is over.

Red Wings Favored To Win Stanley Cup 7th Time

DETROIT (AP)—There is always room in sports for a new recordholder, and the Detroit Red Wings are taking dead aim at a "lucky" seventh Stanley Cup hockey title.

The Red Wings have won the coveted trophy six times. One more and they'll be tied with the Toronto Maple Leafs, seven-time cup kings.

Odds-makers say the Red Wings will go all the way this year and, judging from the records, it's hard to see at this point who can stop them.

The power-packed Detroiters jumped off to a 1-0 lead in their best-of-seven semi-final series against Toronto Tuesday night, whipping the Leafs 7-4. The teams will meet again in Olympia Stadium tonight, with the Wings as heavy favorites to make it two straight.

The Detroiters haven't lost at home since before Christmas, and the Maple Leafs, who have beaten the Wings only once in the last eight tries, don't seem to be in a position to end that streak.

Detroit won its first Stanley Cup title in 1936. It followed up with wins in 1937-43-50-52-54. It should be noted that the Wings have never been able to win two years in a row.

Dr. MacKinnon, who was introduced to the curlers by Premier Matheson, based his interesting speech on the history of Charlottetown, stressing mainly incidents and events of the early days of the city and the province itself.

Also in attendance were several members of Don Messer's Islanders including vocalists Marg Osborne and Charlie Chamberlain who entertained while the dinner was being served. Jim Vance from Moncton also rendered several vocal selections.

Propaganda emanating from the Hub City has tended to vilify the Island club. The team, acting individually and collectively, did what it did for good reasons. One Moncton sports writer, in a fit of impartiality, came through with the understatement of the year by admitting that O'Connor "was provoked in a distasteful manner"; however, after this bold quickly fell again to writing tearing jerking copy to be lapped up by the "outraged" supporters of the Baig Boys.

But now, let's to the game. With the Islanders in town, turnstiles clicked merrily all evening stogging both Stadium and cash register to the bursting point. Fever ran high but all went merry as a marriage bell until the third period. The trouble began when Islanders defenseman Danny O'Connor was charged violently into the boards by a Moncton player who appeared intent on taking him out of the game.
