TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Death of the Dowager Empress.

BERLIN, Jan. 8. At the opening of the Reichstag this morning the President formally announced the death of Dowager Empress Augusta and paid a high tribute to her memory. The House adopted a resolution of sympathy to Emperor William and adjourned as a mark of respect. The Emperor ordered the Court to go into mourning for three months and general mourning for six weeks. The places of amusement have been closed for a week. The body of the Empress will be taken to Schloss at midnight to-morrow. The funeral will probably take place Saturday.

LONDON, Jan. 8. The Gazette announces that the Court will wear mourning for the Empress Augusta for four weeks. The Berlin papers are full of praise of the late Dowager Empress. They refer especially to her charity and great love of justice.

The Influenza Epidemic.

LONDON, Jan. 8. The influenza epidemic in this city is decreasing, but it is extending in the provinces. Prince George, second son, and Princess Victoria, second daughter of the Prince and Princess of Wales have been attacked with influenza.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. Mortality here keeps increasing. The death reported to the Bureau of Vital Statistics for the twenty-four hours ending noon to-day figured up 250—the highest yet.

Trying to Settle.

OTTAWA, Jan. 8. E. W. Plunkett has been here for some time endeavoring to settle a claim against the federal government for a quarter of a million dollars. Mr. Plunkett is interested in the Western Counties Railway in Nova Scotia. The company leased the Windsor branch from the government, and the lease was afterwards cancelled; hence arose the claim. He is quite willing to settle for certain annual payments; but if he is unable to do so, will probably enter a petition of right in the exchequer Court.

An Incendiary Speech.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. At a mass meeting of the colored citizens of Hudson County, last night, after a conservative address by Thos. Fortune, of the Africa-American League, Price Williams, of local colored celebrity, made an incendiary speech, during which he said that when the colored man learns the value of the torch as a weapon, when he learns to kill in cold blood, when he learns to plunge the knife into the heart of the white man, then will there be no question about the rights of the colored man. There was some applause at Williams' remarks.

Lack of Confidence.

LISBON, Jan. 8. The papers here reproduce without comment the British African Land Company's cable despatches and statements made by Scottish missionaries concerning affairs in Africa. Little credence is placed on the despatches or statements, as they come from interested sources.

Church and State.

RIO JANEIRO, Jan. 8. An official decree just promulgated proclaims the separation of church and state, guarantees religious liberty and equality and continues the life stipend granted under monarchy.

A Great Success.

COATICOOK, Que., Jan. 8. The banquet to Hon. Mr. Colby was a great success. The President of the Council, with Hon. Messrs. Bowell, Costigan and Foster, left for Ottawa at two o'clock this morning.

Successful Observation?

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8. The Lick Observatory has been notified from South America that the observation of the eclipse of the sun on December 22nd was entirely successful, and the expedition is homeward bound.

Very Commendable.

OTTAWA, Jan. 8. Hon. John Macdonald, a Liberal Senator, has given forty thousand dollars to start a new hospital in Toronto.
