SUDDEN DEATH.—A man named William Risk died suddenly at St. John, N. B., on Monday. He had been drinking heavily, and coming out of a liquor saloon walked only a short distance when he fell dead in the arms of a companion. He was forty years old and was a book-keeper.

MORE POISONING.—William Nicholson, a farmer living near Hagerville, Ont., and his family, ate some wild parsnips a few days ago. All were taken ill and one child, aged 10, died shortly after eating. Antidotes were administered to the others, who, with the exception of a girl aged 13, are expected to recover.

ADVISING GERMANY.—At a largely attended meeting of Protestants at Toronto recently a resolution was adopted and ordered to be forwarded to Emperor William of Germany condemning the return of the Jesuits to Germany and hoping that he would keep the Roman Catholics in that country in subjection.

COMMENDABLE.—The crossings at Clements' corner and the crossings and plankway in the neighbourhood of King Square, asked for through THE EXAMINER a few days ago, have all been put down. The chairman of the Street Committee is deserving of every credit for his prompt action in respect to these matters.

A CITY COUNCIL RESIGNS.—A remarkable state of affairs has been brought about at Weston, W. Va., by a recent civic election. It appears that a month ago a prohibition council and mayor were chosen. The refusal to grant liquor licenses cut down the estimated revenue for the year nearly 50 per cent. The city had made heavy contracts for lighting and improvements, and the prohibition Council foresaw a large deficit. In order to escape the difficulty the entire council has resigned within the last two weeks, and nobody can be secured to fill the places. The city is without a government, and without revenues, and in the meanwhile the sale of liquor goes merrily on.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 16.

The House was occupied all the afternoon with the consideration of Thompson's criminal law amendment bill. The bill was read a third time and passed.

After recess the House went into committee of ways and means.

With respect to the glass duties, Hon. Mr. Foster made several minor changes. Rough and rolled colorless plate glass was made to read rough and rolled plate glass. Silvered plate glass was made to read silvered glass in panes of plate glass. The extra duty of one cent per square foot if bevelled, is made two cents. These two items were struck out: For felt hats \$1.50 per dozen, and 20 per cent ad valorem, and ladies hats and caps 25 per cent ad valorem. Instead hats and bonnets generally, are to be 30 per cent ad valorem.

The items respecting iron tubing were altered as to dimensions of pipe and duty so as to make the tax just the same as before, but the importation to be under regulations imposed by the Governor-General in Council. The words "when not turned" are inserted in the said items. In the meat duties is added the item: "Salted beef in barrels 2 cents per pound." In the case of all imports of meat, the cases or barrels are to be free. Mustard seed is put on the free list in place of paying ten cents per pound. In paper hangings, white blanks and white paper and satins will be three cents per roll instead of two cents. Garden seeds, in bulk or large packages, will be ten per cent, instead of fifteen. With respect to starch, the weight of the package is to be included in all cases. In the weight for duty in molasses, the polariscope test is made from 30 degrees to 56, in place of from 30 to 55, and in all cases the package to be exempt from duty.

The changes noted above were all made on motion of Hon. Mr. Foster, being the outcome of representations made since the new tariff was submitted with the Budget. The committee rose at 11.30, and the House adjourned.

The United States Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, April 16.

The Tariff Bill was presented to the House this afternoon. At the last moment the Republican members of the Ways and Means Committee decided to place hides and sugar on the free list, though in the latter case a bounty of two cents per pound on sugar below No. 10, and 1 cent on sugar above 16 is provided for. The bill reduces the revenue about \$71,000,000. Of this amount, \$61,000,000 is on customs, and \$10,000,000 on internal revenue. A minority report was presented by the Democratic members of the committee. It strongly attacks the majority report for refusal to sufficiently reduce the burden of taxation. McKenna (Republican member of the committee) presented a report against the sugar schedule of the bill.

Big Lumber Fire.

OLDTOWN, Me., April 16.

Six acres of lumber piles at Millford, Me., were burned over this afternoon, causing a loss of about \$1,000,000, on which there was little or no insurance. The heaviest sufferers are Faiver & Thatcher who lose four million feet of pine box lumber; L. N. Gould, fifteen million feet, and W. P. Wadleigh, one million seven hundred thousand feet.

A Dishonest Clerk.

TORONTO, April 16.

The investigation into the affair of Maximilian Meyerby, police clerk, who recently absconded, disclosed the fact that he was \$10,000 short. There are several actions threatened against the city for false arrest for non-payment of fines imposed when actually they had paid Meyerby and obtained receipts.

An Alderman Unsated.

HALIFAX, April 16.

Alderman E. O'Donnell has been fined \$400 for violating the Independence of Council Act by sitting and voting as an Alderman while he had a contract with the city. The verdict unsates O'Donnell. This is the first case tried under the Act.

Lieut.-Governor Angers Married.

QUEBEC, April 16.

His Honor Lieut.-Governor Angers was married this morning to Mrs. Arthur Hanel, by Abbe Casgrain, one of Sillery, in the chapel of Sillery Convent.

Lecture in St. Patrick's Hall.

A FAIR audience assembled in St. Patrick's Hall last evening to hear Rev. M. J. McMillan lecture on "The Early History of Prince Edward Island." Rev. P. A. McInnes presided. The lecturer began his discourse by calling the attention of those present to the many advantages to be derived from a study of the early history of the Island. He then spoke of the different discoverers sent out by France and England who touched at the Island, and proceeding, referred to the early French inhabitants and to how they had been attracted by the value of the fisheries and the fertility of the soil. The difference was between England and France were dealt with, as also the disputes between them concerning the Isle St. Jean, and how it was finally given up to England. The lecturer then told how the name St. Jean was changed to Prince Edward in honor of Prince Edward then stationed at Halifax. The different governors from 1790 until 1830 were then reviewed, as also a brief history of their rule. The rev. gentleman concluded his interesting and instructive address by a fitting eulogy on the life and labors of the late Bishop McEachern, who did so much for the early people of the Island.

A vote of thanks was, on motion of John McSwain, Esq., seconded by Mr. McIsaac, tendered the lecturer, to which he made a brief reply.
