Manufacturers Life Annual Report

The Manufacturers Life report Business in Force of \$1,300,000,000. The new business in 1950 was \$22 million greater than that written in the previous year and amounted to \$179 million.

Payments made to policyholders under their contracts totalled \$23 million and were distributed to beneficiaries and policyholders in death claims, matured endowments, annuity payments and other policy benefits, including \$2 3-4 million in dividends to policyholders.

The Assets of the Company grew to \$413 million. Government and Government guaranteed bonds constituted 25 per cent of Assets and corporation and municipal bonds 37 per cent; mortgages constituted 17 1-2 per cent of Assets and preferred and common stocks 10 per cent.

The rate of interest earned on the Assets was 4.22 per cent, an increase over the previous year's rate of 4.02 per cent, the increase being due to the cumulative effect of change in the distribution of invested Assets.

The mortality experience was very favorable and Contingency Reserve and Surplus now amount to \$25,600,000.

A telegram will now go to the Dominion Command of the Legion and also to the local member of Parliament pleading of the unanimous support of the O'Leary Legion.

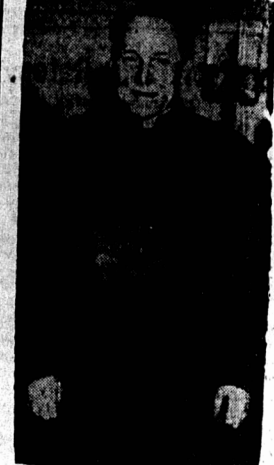
