BANK OF MONTREAL STOCK has fallen to 193.

P. E. ISLAND OATS, in carloads, are on sale in Moncton—"the home market."

ONE hundred and fifty thousand Envelopes, various kinds, just opened by BREMNER BROS. [dec 2:1]

MAYOR McINTOSH, of Ottawa, is on his way home from England, having succeeded in floating the bonds of the Gatineau Valley Railway.

The steamer, "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax last night with freight. She sails on return this evening with a cargo of produce.

ZION CHURCH—The Rev. John Burwash, M. A., will preach in Zion Church to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock, and Rev. William Scott at 6.30 p. m.

UPPER PRINCE STREET METHODIST CHURCH—Rev. William Scott will preach in Upper Prince Street Methodist Church at 10.30 to-morrow morning.

NEW GOODS for the Christmas season, Staples, &c. opened to-day by BREMNER BROS. [dec 2:1]

It is stated that the Governor-General will not return to the capital until the middle of January, and that the Princess Louise will spend the winter in British Columbia.

HON. MR. MOUSSEAU intends reducing the expenditure of the departments of the Quebec House at the forthcoming session. It is stated that the reduction will be at least fifty per cent.

The Customs receipts of St. John for November, were \$6,940.17 in excess of the same month last year. The Island revenue receipts were \$215.23 in excess of the same period in 1881.

The University set of Xmas Cards; also, Canadian House Plants, Birds, Berries and Scenery—for the first time out this season and opened to-day by Bremner Bros. [dec 2:1]

SCOTT ACT—Bernard Callaghan was yesterday fined \$50 for a breach of the Canada Temperance Act. The McKinnon case from Summerside dismissed by the Supreme Court on Monday will be appealed to Ottawa.

The cargo of the Steamer "Carroll" for Boston on Thursday evening, consisted of 4,574 bags and 395 barrels potatoes, 613 cans of lobsters, 90 empty oil barrels, 233 cans of eggs, 62 bundles of canvass and junk, and 35 barrels mackerel.

The statement of the Halifax Herald that the Island boats will go into winter quarters after this week, is incorrect. They will not discontinue running until stopped by ice. From present indications they will run for some weeks yet.

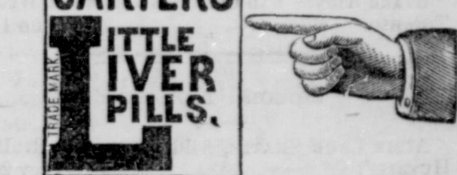
