POLITICAL PICNICS—FIRES

DIABOLICAL TREATMENT OF A LADY.

(Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.) MONTREAL, July 31.

The Premier, it is said, will inaugurate a series of political picnics when in the Lower Provinces, at which Dr. Tupper will meet him.

A fire here last night destroyed a large box factory. Loss \$10,000.

The Governor General has left for the North West. A fire in Hull last night destroyed twelve large buildings. Loss \$40,000; insurance, \$22,000.

A person named Sturdy—a citizen of Guelph—has been arrested for abducting the niece of the Sheriff of Wellington. Her treatment when in his hands was diabolical.

Riots in the States.

(Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.) NEW YORK, July 31.

The strike prospects are growing brighter. The war is practically finished. The workmen are resuming operations.

NEW YORK, July 30.

Rumors of a strike prevail at New Orleans, but the Government is prepared and determined to put down rioting the bud.

The strike on the Wisconsin, Kansas and Texas road has terminated; the company will gently concede the strikers' demands.

More engineers, firemen, and pump men of the Delaware and Hudson Co. struck and the mines are rapidly flooding.

At Key, West Virginia, seven freight trains were stopped by strikers, first being wrecked, preventing others proceeding.

At Dunmore fifty disguised men destroyed the engine house and fired several other places and then fled. All work is now suspended in the mines and shops in Wyoming and Lackawanna Valleys.

A London despatch says the market is excited and depressed throughout. There are fears of a general European war which will involve England.

COLUMBUS, O., July 30.

The Pittsburg, Cincinnati and St. Louis Railway is receiving freight for all points. The Miami trains are running interruptedly.

CHICAGO, July 30.

All the roads except the Lake Shore and Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, are running both freight and passenger trains.

PITTSBURG, July 30.

All is quiet; the strike has apparently ended. Freight and passenger trains on the Pittsburg division of the Baltimore and Ohio road are running on schedule time.

The stock trains on the Pennsylvania road are moving as rapidly as they are got ready.

Three trains were sent out under guard, but there was no trouble, and the guards are now dispensed with.

On the Fort Wayne roads, the efforts are mainly to clear the tracks of the rolling stock accumulated for 15 miles below the city. All the workmen in the shops of this road have returned to work.

BALTIMORE, July 30.

A jury of inquest into causes which led to the death of ten victims of the riot in this city on the 20th, when the Sixth regiment fired into a mob, to-day entered upon the examination of witnesses.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 30.

Capt. Daniel Dunham, of the schooner Emma, of St. John, N. B., left his vessel on the 27th, and has not returned.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 30.

Gallagher, the striker who stopped a mail train on the Morris and Essex road by presenting a pistol at the head of the mail agent, has been committed for trial in default of \$5,000 bail.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, July 30.

A special from Alexandria says that Cleopatra's needle and the ship for its conveyance London, will be launched on the 10th of August.

The Athenaeum contradicts a report that Vernon Harcourt has undertaken to write the life of the late John Lythrop Motley, the American historian.

The Court of Aldermen of London have resolved, by a vote of 19 to 1, that Sir John Bennett is a fit and proper person to support the dignity of alderman. Bennett was recently elected by a close vote. He is Radical.

WARD MEETING.

A large public meeting of the rate-payers of Ward one was last evening, held at the new Engine House, King Street. Mr. A. A. McKenzie was appointed Chairman.

COUNCILLOR MURPHY entered into a lengthy, elaborate and eloquent defence of his conduct as Councillor for the Ward, and answered questions asked by F. T. Newbery Esq., and others.

F. T. NEWBERY, Esq., expressed his regret that a public meeting had not been called before the nomination of any candidate. He said that he was satisfied with the greater number of the explanations made by Councillor Murphy.

Before voting for Mr. Peake he should like to know whether or not he was in favor of the introduction of a supply of water. He, for his part, would not vote for his own brother unless he would support a reasonable scheme for procuring a water supply.

If water could be obtained for \$100,000, he believed the investment would be one of the best ever made by the city. Mr. Newbery concluded by expressing his regret that the city was about to lose the services, at the Council Board, of a man so progressive and able as Mr. Murphy.

A McNEILL, Esq., delivered a short but forcible speech, and moved that the thanks of the meeting be tendered Mr. Murphy for his services as Councillor for Ward 1—coupled with an expression of regret that he is about to retire from the Council Board.

The resolution passed unanimously. We regret that we are unable this morning to give a full report of the meeting.
