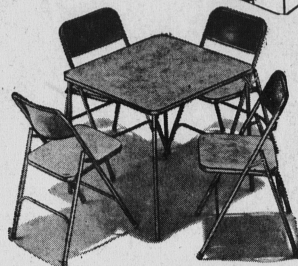
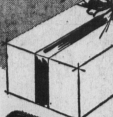

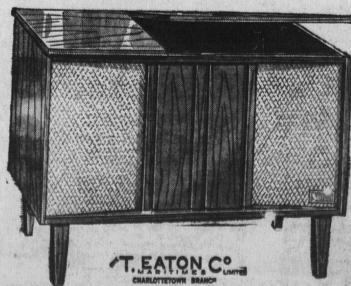

### Regional School District Expenses Total \$23,780

TIGNISH — The annual meeting of the Tignish Regional High School districts, adjourned from the May meeting until the auditors report was made available, was held in the school auditorium Tuesday evening.

Everett Broderick, chairman of trustees, requested that all outstanding taxes should be paid in order to keep the school operating properly. Mrs. Roy Gallant, secretary, read the auditor's report and the amount each district is assessed for the coming year. The total operating expenses for the school totaled \$23,780.

Gerald Handrahan, president of the home and school associations, spoke on the program planned for the next meeting in January. Discussion and study will be held concerning high school problems, teachers and trustees from rural areas were asked to attend.

### Liquor Laws OK Here; Taverns Not Likely

When queried as to whether or not the government should allow taverns to operate in the province Premier Walter R. Shaw said, "I think we must use discretion in the type and character of places that may be opened."

The premier felt that the people appeared satisfied with the ways things are. He said, "at present it doesn't look like the government will make further changes in its system of licensing and control of liquor in the next session of the legislature."

He said the tighter system of licensing and control of outlets that went into effect last June "has operated satisfactorily and the Liquor Control Commission has been successful in carrying out the provisions of the amended Liquor Control Act."

The premier said the commission is "doing a good job in enforcing liquor outlet regulations and he thinks it is evidence of this that some places have been closed for not living up to the regulations."

He said "in all cases where liquor is sold the secret of success is control and proper disciplinary action."

The premier said "people appear satisfied with the new system and there have been no representations for change."

NOT LOOSENEED There has been a feeling in some places, however, that liquor laws were loosened. This is not the case. Liquor has been under more strict control and he thinks the whole situation has improved.

Mentioning centennial year celebrations, the premier said "we had many conventions, the meeting of the Canadian premiers and the visit of Queen Elizabeth and on all these occasions there was little or no evidence of intoxication on the streets."

The premier said that his government has not decided definitely on any action.

ely on the opening date of the next session of the legislature. It was learned, however, that the matter was discussed at yesterday's cabinet meeting. One source suggested that the government is thinking of Thursday, Feb. 25, as the opening date.

The premier suggested recently that the session should not take more than six weeks a day.
