AUSTRALIAN COMMONWEALTH

Imperial Desire that Canada Shall be Represented at the Opening Ceremony.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—The departure for Australia of the Duke and Duchess of York has been postponed for a short period, and from present appearances the formal inauguration of the Commonwealth will take place on the first of February instead of the first of January.

Much disappointment is being expressed in Colonial circles at the announcement that Canada would not be represented at the great Australian function, and it is said that the postponement of the Duke and Duchess' departure is due in large measure to desire of the Home Government to secure the presence of a representative of Canada at the great gathering. Communications have been passing between London and Ottawa during the past few days, and it is confidently believed that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be induced by his colleagues to make the journey to the Antipodes. It is reported there that he may be accompanied by Sir Louis Davies.

ANOTHER OPEN LETTER

To the Hon. Donald Farquharson, Premier.

SIR,—I have read your manifesto to the electors of the Second District of Queen's with a great deal of surprise and astonishment that the great man did not spread his wings by addressing it to the electors of P. E. Island. The measure of your capacity can only reach the Second District and perhaps you did well to confine yourself to it.

Let us briefly review the logic advanced by you. Your reasons for appealing to the people at this time are neither sound nor logical,—as the same reasons existed previous to the last session when Mr. Wise was cheated out of his seat and Pineau transformed into a supporter under circumstances, to say the least dark and suspicious.

You say you have been to Ottawa and made a demand on the Federal Government for an increase of subsidy. Yet you fail to publish a copy of the memorial presented by you to the ministers, and you have nothing but your own bald statement to submit to the electors of this Province. In 1897 the general election was carried with the cry of an arbitration and Peters and yourself were to obtain over two millions for this Province. False hope and false cry; for during the last four years neither yourself nor your party did anything—nor received any—no, not the faintest acknowledgement that arbitration or anything would be granted.

It requires cheek and a great deal of impudence on your part to come forward this time with another such cry when you have nothing to show in support of your claim.

By mystifying and falsifying the accounts you boldly assert that there was a surplus, when you knew in your innermost heart that there was a deficit. You claim a surplus of \$6,174.47. Now, let us see. By your own figures you received \$282,677.81 and expended \$302,503.34. These figures show a deficit of \$19,825.53, to which must be added the amount claimed by you to be set apart for sinking and trust funds, \$15,569.17, which you have spent in reducing the balance in the banks, and makes a deficit of \$35,394.70.

In the presence of these facts are we not warranted in charging you with falsification of the public accounts—a crime which should forever drive you out of public life and confidence?

Your charges against the Conservatives I need not waste time or space in refuting, as they have been punished for their shortcomings. But now the electors have to do with you and your promises. You promised no taxation, that you would make revenue and expenditure meet, that you would get an arbitration and an increased subsidy from Ottawa,—in all of which you sadly failed.

Your attitude on the liquor question I need not refer to, as your License Act will ever stand as a monument of your sincerity in the cause of temperance.

The unpopularity of the Government of which you are leader is so pronounced throughout the country that the false representations contained in your manifesto will not be credited by the intelligent electors, and we feel assured that your appeal for a renewed lease of power will be in vain.

TUNNEL BOSTON HARBOR.

Such a Plan is Projected to Assist Export Business.

Boston, Nov. 28.—To carry out the hoped-for development of Boston's export trade it is necessary that extensive improvements of Boston Harbor and terminal facilities be consummated. The harbor is being dredged and the railroad yards re-located and extended. It is now reported that in addition a tunnel may shortly be built to connect the state docks in South Boston with those projected on the East Boston shore. Surveyors and engineers are busy on what appear to be preparations for this scheme. The tunnel, if built, will be constructed either by the railroads or the state. It would effect a great saving in time and expense.
