

# Hemus Dares Umpire To Recommend A Fine

CINCINNATI (AP)—Solly Hemus declared Tuesday the latest of his six ejections by National League umpires is the last straw and he virtually dared umpire Stan Landes to recommend a fine or suspension.

The fiery Little St. Louis Cardinal manager—ejected by Landes after just 13 minutes of action Monday night—asserted Landes was out of shape and "can't move off a dime."

Hemus vowed his ejection was all a mistake—that a remark he intended for pitcher Vinegar Bend Mizell and not for Landes caused it. General manager Bing Devine and catcher Hal Smith backed him up.

"Landes was the first to use profanity when he yelled to our dugout," said the incensed Hemus.

**WRONG MAN?**

"As I walked past Hal Smith, I told him to 'make him bear down,' referring to Mizell. Landes thought I was referring to him and said, 'you're out of the game.'"

Devine said:

"It was the most ridiculous ejection I've seen."

Hemus has fought a losing battle in his jousts with National

League umpires in his freshman season. He was fined \$250 and suspended for five days after a flopping-mad protest involving a foul tip in a game with the Los Angeles Dodgers July 2 in St. Louis.

Solly denied Shag Crawford's charge of bodily contact. A fan stalked onto the field and slugged plate umpire Bill Jachowski after Hemus was ejected. It was the first such incident in the majors in almost 10 years. Hemus asked and got a hearing on the contact charge but apparently nothing ever came of it.

**BLASTS SETUP**

Confident of no recrimination from the league office this time, Solly blasted Landes and the umpiring setup. Said Hemus of Landes:

"I think it's a disgrace to professional umpiring to have a man so out of shape. He's close to 300 pounds, can't move off a dime, can't see the plays. Why, he weighs 10 pounds less than a horse."

The Red bird manager asserted that good umpires should be paid \$25,000 a year, but others should

be farmed out if they don't measure up.

"We have specialists in everything else in baseball," he said. "Umpires aren't infallible, so why not rate them and pay them accordingly?"

Hemus said Landes put Mizell in the hole from the start with his calls. Mizell was knocked out in the fourth and St. Louis lost, 3-2.

## Only Minor Problems Remain For Patterson-Johansson Bout

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP)—American boxing promoter, Bill Rosensohn, said Tuesday night only "minor problems" remain to be settled for the Johansson-Patterson rematch.

Rosensohn, leaving after negotiating with heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson and his adviser Edwin Ahlquist, for two days admitted no final settlement was reached.

However, he said he was "very optimistic."

"Johansson is very eager to fight, and Floyd Patterson is very eager to fight. I am now going back to the States to get

the figures Johansson has asked and I am sure that it will straighten things out," Rosensohn said at the Toroslunda Airport.

At a news conference Monday Ahlquist said there will be no negotiations about a world title fight until all questions are fully settled about the income of the June 26 Johansson-Patterson fight in which Ingemar won the title.

Ahlquist disclosed that Irvin Kahn of the TelePrompster Company—which held the radio and

closed circuit television rights for the last fight—had promised to give Rosensohn the figures he and Johansson demanded.

"Then the way is open for a rematch at Yankee Stadium on September 22," both Ingemar and Ahlquist said.
