

# Glace Bay Miners In 4-3 Victory In Game With Sydney Millionaires

SYDNEY, Jan. 13 (CP) — Glace Bay Miners started another bid to jump out of the Maritime Major Hockey League cellar here tonight when they stopped their old rivals, Sydney Millionaires, 4-3. The win cut Sydney's hold on their place to four points.

It was an unusual Sydney-Glace Bay clash with referee Charlie Goode not calling a single penalty over the three periods.

Miners had a 2-1 lead in the first period. Sydney got them back in the second, then the Macey-Raynak-Backer string fired two goals in 18 seconds in the last period to make victory certain. Sydney managed to get back one goal, but goalie Don Lockhart came up with some fine saves in the late minutes to halt the desperate Sydney bids.

Goode Miller, ex-Halifax and Moncton player, scored the two first period goals. Johnny Raynak got the third tally, and playing coach Hub Macey tipped home a Lloyd Hinchberger drive shortly after for the winning marker. Hinchberger also set up the Raynak score.

Bill McEonagh, Nick Hill and Freddie Hildebrand were the Sydney goal getters.

Nick Pidsodny handled 31 saves

against 23 for Lockhart.

The Glace Bay Miners may have centremen Kenny Watson in time for Friday night's game with the Islanders here. Sunday at a meeting of the C.A.H.A. the Miners were awarded Watson's services. There has been some speculation that Watson might not wish to report to the Miners but according to word received here last night there was a good possibility that the smooth skating centremen who played with Saint John Beavers last season would join the Glace Bay camp shortly. The Miners also hope to add another centremen and defenceman Danny Nixon. If they do they will have a fairly potent club.

Marcel Clements of the Islanders in sports had a pair of knees these days. Marcel was injured several weeks ago and has been playing under difficulties since then. Monday night on several occasions it was noticed that his leg injuries were aggravated but always he kept coming back for more. He was in trouble just after the third period started but seconds later he raced through the line in defence to score on one of the smartest efforts of the night.

The player who took the most punishment during the rugged game was the Atlantics' Billy Ford. The fast-skating left winger was a sitting duck for both Ronnie Hurst and Larry Travis. Actually this has been the case all season but Monday night Hurst and Travis appeared to be hitting Ford every time he turned around. Ford is a player who can stand a lot of watching. He is as sharp around the net as any one in the M.M.H.L.

## Played Prominent Roles In Success Of Old Abbie Team

# Seek Replacement

There were three Charlottetown hockey players who played prominent roles in the success of the Charlottetown Abbies of 1921-22-23 and whose names were omitted in yesterday's picture-story of that famous club.

The players were Perley "Chick" Williams, George Buntain and the late Jack "Fairy" Callaghan.

Williams played with the Abbies during the 1922 season and went up to Boston the following year. He played with an amateur team in Boston but returned to Saint John to join the Abbies for their game against the Toronto Granites on Jan. 10, 1923. The Granites won the game 3-1 and later went on to win the World's Amateur Championship. Williams scored the Abbies lone goal.

George Buntain and Jack Callaghan played with the Abbies during the 1923 season.

In connection with the Granites it has been pointed out that they formed the Montreal Maroons a year or two after they defeated the Abbies. In 1925 they won the National Hockey League Championship and their stars were the men who starred against the Abbies in Saint John.

In yesterday's story of the Abbies it was stated that they won three consecutive Maritime Championships. Last night their goalie Harry "Stonewall" Morgan stated that they won two championships while compiling a won 30, lost one and tied one record during a two year period.

# Cardinals Warned To Watch Weight

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 13 (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals were told today by Eddie Stanky, their manager and dietitian, to watch off the potatoes and gravy if they want a share of the World Series gravy.

The Redbird field leader, voted the 1952 manager of the year in the National League, told each player in notations on a form letter how much the player was expected to weigh on reporting for spring training at St. Petersburg, Fla.

Stanky's policy of fining overweight players at a rate of \$2 a pound will remain in force.

"If you have a weight problem, try eating two meals a day and cut out the following: bread, butter, potatoes and gravy. . . . Stanky said in his letter.

# Former Baseball Player Sick

BALTIMORE, Jan. 13 (AP)—Charles (Buck) Herzog, one of baseball's all-time greats with New York Giants and Chicago Cubs, was taken to hospital today, penniless and sick.

He was a contemporary of some of the greatest names in baseball, John J. McGraw, Christy Mathewson, and Ty Cobb.

Herzog started playing on the Baltimore sandlots and rose up to become manager of the Cincinnati Reds. After three years, he was traded to the Giants for Mathewson, Bill McKechnie, later manager of the Reds, Eddie Roush and \$1,500, a lot of money those days.

Herzog played in four World Series and was field captain of the Chicago Cubs for two seasons.

# Marlene Stewart Named Canada's Top Athlete For Second Year In Row

TORONTO, Jan. 14 (CP)—Marlene Stewart, the Fonthill, Ont., youngster who ruled the Canadian golfing world in 1951, has been chosen Canada's outstanding woman athlete for the second year in a row.

The 19-year-old golfing sensation won going away in the annual Canadian Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters. She polled 81 votes on a 3-2-1 voting system, 51 more than her closest competitor.

Youth was the keynote in the 1952 listings. The top three places were taken by athletes 20 years of age or under. Several of the others on the list were also in the teen-age bracket.

Miss Stewart captured the national women's close golf championship for the second year in a row, and her all-round performance in 1952 was only slightly less amazing than her first year in top competition, when she gathered in the Ontario women's open, the Canadian open and the Canadian close championships.

The second-place winner was another golfer, 20-year-old Mary Gay of Kitchener, Ont. whose performance in the 1952 open eclipsed even Miss Stewart's. She forged through

to the final match losing out to Edean Anderson of Helena, Mont. Miss Stewart was eliminated in the semi-finals.

The third choice was 16-year-old Shirley Campbell of Fergus, Ont., winner of the women's three-mile swim at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Olympic competitors were favored. Nine of the 24 women listed were on Canada's Olympic teams in 1948 or 1952.

Tennis, a sport which usually gives several women to the list of outstanding athletes, this year placed only one. She was Mariette Laframboise of Montreal, Canadian junior champion in 1952.

Two perennial choices who again made the list were Ada McKenzie of Toronto, five times winner of the Canadian women's open golf championship, and Barbara Ann Scott, former world's champion figure skater now on the professional ice show circuit.
