

**Want of System.**

It is not pleasant to be brought into very intimate contact with people who do everything at haphazard, and have no system in the ordering of their daily life. You are never sure of their keeping an appointment; if you are to start with them on an important exhibition, and the carriage is at the door, they will linger about, pottering over some trifling matter, until it is too late to reach the train or you will have to go at a break-neck speed to do it. They seem to take no note of time, and if nobody suffered but themselves, nobody would care. If you are obliged to ask such people to be your guests, they rarely appear at the time designated, and are quite sure not to go when the day for their departure arrives; they are down late in the morning, and sit up very late at night; are uncertain about their meals, intrude upon your privacy at unseasonable hours, and are sublimely different to the fact that they are a plague and a nuisance to the whole household.
