THE HALIFAX DEMONSTRATION AN IMMENSE SUCCESS.

The Speeches Well Received.

Grit Fallacies Dispelled

HALIFAX, Oct. 21. The Liberal Conservative demonstration to-night was the most successful political meeting ever held in Halifax, not even excepting the great meetings held by Sir Charles Tupper in 1878. Notwithstanding the threatening state of the weather the Drill Shed was packed to its utmost capacity. Notwithstanding the efforts of the Recorder newspaper to induce the Grit gang to create a disturbance at the meeting the very best order was preserved, and those who went to make a noise doubtless left thoroughly convinced of the rottenness of Gritism, Repeal venice, etc., and the growing popularity of the Liberal Conservatives with the masses. Thomas E. Kenny presided, and the speeches of the Cabinet Ministers, Hon. Messrs. Thompson, White and Foster, were greeted with frequent and hearty applause.

Liberal Meeting at Chatham.

CHATHAM, Oct. 21. The Grit meeting in the skating rink to-night was attended by 700 people. The first speaker was Mr. Burchill, who charged the Dominion Government with creating huge scandals, and largely increasing the public expenditure which the Grits, if returned to power would rectify. J. B. Snowball followed, saying he would, if chosen by the Grits, contest the County next election. He was followed by Dr. Alward. Hon. L. H. Davies went over the same ground as in Moncton, the only new point taken up being the Northwest rebellion, in which he tried to prove that the Government had been guilty of masterly inactivity. The meeting closed at 11 o'clock with cheers for Davies, Alward, Blake and the Queen.

Employers to Retaliate.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21. The Philadelphia manufacturers association yesterday issued an edict declaring that unless the striking employees of Wm. P. Troth & Co., in Frankford, return to work before November 3rd, a general lock out will ensue, to take effect on that date. This action will deprive not less than 75,000 of employment, and will represent the stoppage of about \$100,000 per day in wages.

A Murderer Confesses.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21. David Googlier, a German, who raided a woman and her two children in a house at Palmer Rapids, set fire to it and murdered the woman when she broke out, has confessed the crime. He claims that the woman attacked him first and by her language aggravated him into dealing her the blows which caused her death.

An Unfortunate Steamer.

LONDON, Oct. 21. The Furness Line steamer, Durham City, from Boston, which arrived at London today, encountered a hurricane on the 10th, lost 41 head of cattle and had her rails carried away. To-day she collided with the steamer Anna Webster and had a hole punched in her bow.

A Fatal Explosion.

SANDY HOOK, N. Y., Oct. 21. While First Lieut. Medcalfe and a soldier named King were loading shell for a 12-inch mortar this afternoon, the shell exploded, blowing King to pieces and injuring Medcalfe so that he died in half an hour.

General Kaulbars Successor.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 21. Gen. Gourke, military commander of Warsaw, will succeed Gen. Kaulbars as Russian agent in Bulgaria.
