

UNITED STATES AND BOXERS.

Great Britain Can Reckon on Assistance of America.

LONDON, June 18.—Commenting upon the supposed hesitation of the United States to participate in the movement to suppress the Boxers, as reported in cable despatches from Washington, the Statist says: "No European power will misunderstand the present hesitation of the United States and jump at the conclusion that American feeling and opinion may be disregarded. The United States will undertake military operations in China as it did against Spain if the protection of its citizens require them or if the powers threaten to exclude American merchants from their rights in China acquired by treaty. Great Britain can reckon on the assistance of the United States and Japan in maintaining even by force the policy of the open door in China."

Indian Famine.

LONDON, June 18.—The following despatch has been received from the viceroy of India, Lord Curzon and Kedleston: "The week's famine reports show a state of general expectancy, pending the advance of the monsoon, which has not yet appeared. Heavy rain has fallen in Burma."

Heavy rain has also fallen in Bengal and the Deltaic and central districts of Behar.

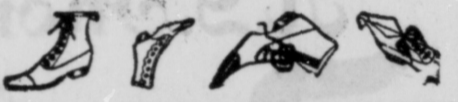
