

Dietenbaker Asks Questions On Drury Montreal Speech

OTTAWA (CP)—Neither the government nor Industry Minister Drury has any intention of acting up government-run newspapers or intervening with the CBC to improve the government's image, Prime Minister Pearson told the Commons. Opposition Leader Dietenbaker peppered Mr. Pearson with questions about a Monday night speech in Montreal by Mr. Drury. He asked whether the government planned to utilize

control of the CBC so the Canadian people will see what the government believes they should see and hear what the government feels they should hear. The exchange was triggered by a Montreal Gazette report that Mr. Drury's reply to a question at the Liberal meeting in his St. Antoine-Westmount riding RECORDED STATEMENT. The story, also carried by the Canadian Press, said that Mr.

Drury suggested the government establish its own communications outlets to publicize its achievements. It reported that Mr. Drury said newspapers, radio and television concentrate on issues which cause argument in Parliament while ignoring important legislation enacted with little fuss. "Perhaps an answer to this problem would be for the government to print its own newspapers and to utilize its control over the CBC by inserting a few programs of its own as well," the Gazette quoted him as saying. In a prepared statement

R. G. L. Fairweather (PC-Royal) asked Mr. Drury whether he could assure the Commons that he did not mean what he said to the riding meeting. Barry Mather (NDP—New Westminster) asked whether the government would agree to pay for an opposition newspaper with public funds. If it is to have its own newspaper. Both were ruled out of order by Speaker Lucien Lamoureux.

Opening lead—five of hearts. Perhaps the most interesting aspect of duplicate bridge is the opportunity the participants have to compare their results on a given hand with those of other pairs who have played exactly the same hand.

Take this deal, which occurred in an eight-table game. Every North-South pair reached a four spades, though the bidding was not identical at each table. The opening lead was always the same—the five of hearts. East cashed the K♥ in every case, but it was on the second trick—when East took the ace—that the defense began to vary.
