P. Q. Police Probe Death Of City Man Near Campbellton

CAMPBELLTON, N. B.—(CP)—Quebec Provincial Police are conducting an investigation in this area into circumstances surrounding the death of a Prince Edward Island man whose body was recovered from the Matapeia River last Thursday.

The body was identified last Friday by the victim's brother, Patrick Murnaghan of Charlottetown, after a coroner's jury was empanelled at Matapeia, Que. The body bore no marks of violence but police have not ruled out the possibility of foul play.

The victim, survived by his wife, was traced to the P.E.I. capital with the help of a tailor's label on his suit. An unemployed construction worker, he had been seeking work in this area before the mishap.

The inquest was adjourned after the jury viewed the body in New Richmond, Que., and is not expected to resume until the police investigation is completed.

Cultural Products Marketing Act. That the producer members of this Board be named from the new board of directors of the Potato Producers Association.

That the two boards be closely integrated and should co-operate in the allocation of the Marketing Board's levy which shall not exceed 1 cent per cwt.

That every producer should be regarded as a member of the Association.

MUST PAY MORE  
Termining one cent per cwt. "measly", Mr. Harry Pridham, Montrose, pleaded for more adequate financing for the growers organization. "We shall never get anywhere unless we are willing to pay for it," he said.

He cited the example set by the big laborers unions who had striven for 25 years to establish the "check off" system, whereby employers were obliged to deduct union dues and pay same directly to the union. In some cases these amounted to \$50 yearly he said.

Mr. Pridham suggested that two to five cents a hundredweight would be a more reasonable levy.

Mr. Pridham's criticism drew a strong protest from Mr. John Dawson, Mr. Dawson declared that such costs as Mr. Pridham envisaged would take half the profit away from the producer. It would equal the cost of loading he added.

DOUBTS ABILITY  
Doubt of the suggested Board's ability to administer the Island's \$10,000,000 industry was expressed by Mr. Austin Laird, New Glasgow.

"I don't think there is one of you but would admit that the job is too big for you," he said. In Mr. Laird's opinion the growers would be better advised to pay greater attention to the pack they place on the market.

"You grow the best potatoes in Canada," he said, "but you must package and grade in a uniform manner."
