The following particulars have been given by the survivors of the Austria disaster:

The pump in connection with the fire engine was not in working order. Some attempts were made to render it available, but the progress of the flames was too rapid. The lifeboats were hanging amidstships, consequently it was impossible to get at all of them.

The following statement is by Andrew Lindstein, a Swedish passenger:

About 2 P. M., 13th September, when the fire broke out, was standing on the deck, about midships. I saw the flames coming up through the windward hatch, three or four feet high.

On running forward, perceived the flames breaking through the fore hatches. At that time saw the Captain rushing up on deck; saw him take his coat off and run to the side of the vessel as if going to jump overboard.

When the fire broke out, observed two vessels in the distance; one of them, a French barque, hove to within a mile of the burning steamer about 5 P. M., and sent two boats towards her.

On the 14th, saw a ship close to the wreck, which proved to be the Catarina. The ship having to make a tack to windward of steamer, it was about daybreak when the captain of the Catarina sent his longboat to pick us up.

THE FIRE AT ST. JOHN'S.—The fire at this place on the 16th instant, was discovered about 7 p.m., issuing from Mr. Baker's stable, near Apple tree well, whence it extended to his dwelling, and in a few minutes the adjoining houses, closely huddled together, were in flames.

The attention of the Government of Newfoundland has been called to the fact of the French Commandant having announced to the British residents of that portion of the Island, called the Bay of St. George, that their concurrent right of fishing would no longer be allowed by the French Government.

There had been large imports of breadstuffs and provisions during the past fortnight from the United States, and paying rates were made with much difficulty. Shipments of fish have been made on a very large scale for this early period of the season.
