City Police Chief Blasts Vandals

"Too many of those out Monday night showed a thorough disregard for law and order and the rights of other people. It is time for action to limit all future Hallowe'en activity — or ban it altogether," said Chief of Police Sterns Whetser Tuesday morning. He went on to say that the cost to the city would prove "very high" and particularly cited the tremendous amount of water wasted through teenage gangs roaming the city and opening hydrants everywhere.

Two cases of burning tires, one in Bonbury and another on the lot in front of Robinson Supplies, and a quantity of hay destroyed at about 10:30 in the vicinity of Jordan Crescent.

At Summerside, town police reported that they received many complaints but no serious damage occurred. The RCMP reported about 35 complaints of damage to property.

Alberton RCMP reported only minor complaints. The only serious incident was the burning of a car in Alberton, the owner of which is reported to be out of the province.

RCMP at Montague reported that the destruction of road signs in this area will run into hundreds of dollars. There were no fires or highway traffic accidents in this area.

Compared to last year, however, the Charlottetown RCMP reported that this Hallowe'en was quieter in their area. Fortunately no serious accidents occurred.

A total of 39 complaints were made to the RCMP and eight arrests were made. RCMP are conducting a thorough investigation into a stolen car incident which occurred at about 10 p.m. Monday at Oyster Bed Bridge. The vehicle was a Volkswagen belonging to Francis Gallant.

New Manager For CMC

The manager of the new Canada Manpower Centre in Charlottetown is G.W. Cheverie, who organized and managed the first Fishermen's Co-operative in King's County. The Manpower Centre takes place of the National Employment Service office, and is part of the Department of Manpower and Immigration announced on Oct. 1.

HAD SECRET PAPERS

TEL AVIV (AP) — Two 20-year-old Jewish youths, named Frenkel and Gibli, were accused by Israeli authorities Tuesday of working for Egyptian intelligence. They were arrested while trying to cross into Egyptian-held Gaza Strip.

The threat was made at a meeting last month of the federal-provincial tax structure committee. "It did not scare those (Premier Johnson) wanted to scare but instead scared the money markets."

The second attempt at "blackmail" was made before last week's fiscal talks when Mr. Johnson said that if he did not get what he was asking for from the federal government he would be forced to institute double taxation in Quebec.

Mr. Lesage said this threat was a tactical error because it had no validity. Double taxation was the solution to tax problems espoused by Mitchell Sharp, federal finance minister. Mr. Lesage had asked at the first tax talks that Quebec be given 100 per cent of income tax revenue and succession duties, and almost 100 per cent of corporation income tax from Quebec companies.

Mr. Lesage said the Union Nationale premier had shown weakness in representing Quebec. He had been fooled, and this was borne out by the commitments paid to him by federal ministers, Mr. Lesage said. "They never paid commitments at the end of federal-provincial conferences in which I participated."

Many Pranks, Damage To Signs In Kings County

MONTAGUE — Hundreds of dollars in damage to traffic signs is being reported as a result of the Hallowe'en celebrations in Kings County on Monday night. RCMP here say damage to traffic signs is extensive and it will take considerable time to get them replaced.

Mailmen also report heavy damage to mail boxes, some of which took place on Sunday night in the Murray Harbour North area. Several sections of the country report baled hay and straw fires on the highway, several of which blocked highways so that the travelling public was forced to detour.

At Murray Harbour an old truck and other moveable equipment was used to block the bridge. It was then set on fire. At Murray River a similar stunt was used to block the bridge there. It was reported that old trailers were hauled onto the bridge and anything else that could be moved then set on fire. Damage to the bridges was slight, however the Department of Highways had to be called to clear them so that traffic could cross.

There was no fire loss and no one was reported injured.

Death Of George Stewart

The death occurred at the Prince County Hospital on Monday, October 31, of George Edward Stewart of Borden, formerly of Milltown Cross in his 88th year.

Born at Peters Road, he spent his entire life in the area and was a factory worker. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Stewart. For the past two years he had lived with his daughter Sadie, Mrs. John MacKenzie, in Borden. His wife was the former Hannah Campbell of Victoria Cross. She predeceased him several years ago. A young son also predeceased him.

Living are a sister Elizabeth, Mrs. Elizabeth Dyer of Bridgewater, Mass., a brother John of Murray Harbour South, Daniel at Kilmuir, Catherine, Mrs. Elizabeth Blackett of Hamilton, Ontario, and Jane, Mrs. George Sorrey of Montague. One brother, William, predeceased him two years ago.

The funeral will take place from the Chisholm Funeral Home at 2:30 today. Interment will take place in the Cape Traverse United Church cemetery.
