AMHERST, N.S. (CP)—Amherst Ramblers broke a five-game losing streak Monday with a 4-2 win over Charlottetown Islanders in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League.

Ramblers fast skating and passing attacks kept the Islanders busy in their own zone and they were unable to shake the Ramblers on the offensive.

The home team was strengthened by the return of Don Rogers who had been sidelined with a knee injury but were without the services of Bob Reid, in hospital with an infected throat, and Rollie Bilo-deau, who left the team for personal reasons.

The veteran Roy (Buck) Whitlock, although held to one goal and two assists last week, continued to lead the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League scoring parade with a total of 21 points, figures released Monday night by secretary-treasurer Robert (Rob) Chandler, show. They do not include Monday's action in the circuit.

The sharp-shooting Whitlock is being hard pressed for scoring honors by teammate Ray LeDuc, 30-year-old Valleyfield native who picked up nine scoring points last week—four goals and five assists—surge to within one point of Whitlock.

TOKYO (Reuters)—An American atomic expert Monday reassured Japan on the dangers of atmospheric radioactivity even as a heavy shower of highly radioactive rain fell on Tokyo.

Dr. Merrill Eisenbud, health and safety laboratory director of the Atomic Energy Commission, told a group of American and Japanese scientists the United States had set an exaggerated safety standard for atmospheric radioactivity. This may be one thousand times below the maximum rate that is safe for human beings, he declared.

Eisenbud spoke at the opening of a five-day conference here on radioactivity. The joint meeting was requested by the Japanese following the wave of alarm that has swept this country over the effects of American and Russian tests of nuclear weapons.

The alarm reached its height when a crew member of the fishing boat Lucky Dragon died last month from injuries incurred when the vessel was caught in a fall of "hot ash" in the Bikini testing area. Since then Japanese scientists have been perturbed by discoveries of radioactivity in fish, rain, vegetables and countless other things.

The shower that drenched Tokyo as the scientists discussed how much radioactivity the human body can stand was analyzed by meteorological researchers and pronounced "highly radioactive."
