Motor Vehicles Shipments Down

OTTAWA, Nov. 14 (CP)—Shipments of motor vehicles from Canadian factories declined during September for the fourth successive month.

The Bureau of Statistics reported today that shipments during the month were down 22 per cent with most of the decline in

passenger cars. Shipments in September totalled 29,861, compared with 38,035 in September last year, bringing the nine-month total to 329,763 from last year's 294,203. The number for sale in Canada declined to 21,132 from 34,517, but in the cumulative period advanced to 292,135 from 270,526.

Shipments of vehicles for export in September showed a marked increase at 8,729 against 3,518 in September last year, and in the nine months totalled 37,628 compared with 23,677.

Eastern Presbytery Held At York Y.P.U. Fall Rally

The Eastern Presbytery Young People held their Fall Rally at York United Church on Monday, November 5th with twelve unions represented. The president, Evelyn Underhay presided.

The afternoon session opened with a very impressive worship service conducted by Georgetown Y.P.U., who chose for their theme "Faith". Sally Johnston presided and the Scripture Lesson, taken from Hebrews 11, was read by Gordon Babineau, followed by a commentary on "Faith" by Janie Llewellyn, after which Anna Mair led in prayer. The service was brought to a close by singing that old familiar hymn, "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross", followed by the Benediction.

Following the worship service, an address of welcome was given by Christine Proude of York Y.P.U., and was responded to by Rev. Howard Christie of Hunter River.

The business period then followed, and in the absence of the secretary, Parker Jewell, Jean MacKenzie of Valleyfield Y.P.U. was appointed acting secretary. The minutes of the Spring Rally held at Pownal, Nov. 24th, were read and approved.

The president spoke briefly about Youth Caravans, which were held throughout the Maritimes last summer, and stressed the need for more workers for this Christian work. She also spoke of the treasurer of Maritime Conference Y. P. U. commending the P. E. I. Unions for being so efficient in sending in their list of officers, fees, and also for the good work they were doing.

A letter was read by the president, from Marion Little, of the Halifax Presbytery regarding the purchasing of a jeep for Dr. Gilchrist, who is a missionary in Angola, Africa. A short discussion followed, and it was decided that this be carried to the evening session.

The following committees were appointed:—
Resolutions Committee: Rev. W. A. Patterson, Blanche MacPhee, Katherine Coffin.
Press Committee: Janie Llewellyn, Gladys MacMillan.
Reports were given by the various Unions on their past year's work and their plans for the coming year.

The group then assembled in York Hall, where a delicious lunch was served by the members of York Y.P.U. During the lunch hour, a short sing-song was conducted by Gurney Lutes.

A lively recreation period followed the lunch hour under the capable leadership of Rev. Howard Christie.

Evening Session
The evening session opened with a short hymn-sing led by Rev. W. F. Corkum. The devotional service followed, conducted by Harvey MacKinnon and Gladys MacMillan of Charlottetown Y. P. U. The theme for the service was "Faith Without Works".

During the service the Misses Mary Morrison and Carol MacRae sang very softly "Whispering Hope". The business period followed, conducted by the president. The minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved. The members of each Union were urged to attend the Y.P.U. Coaching Congress, which is to be held in Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, November 16th to 18th.

An invitation was extended by Valleyfield Y.P.U. to be the guests of their Union for the Spring Rally.

The afternoon's discussion on the purchasing of a jeep for Dr. Gilchrist was continued, and after some discussion it was moved and seconded that the Eastern Presbytery Y. P. U. set an objective of \$300.00 for this worthy cause.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was brought in as follows:

- (1) That the thanks of the Presbytery be extended to York Y.P.U. for holding this Rally and for the delicious lunch that was served.
- (2) That we urge each Union to take part in Shield Competition during the coming year.
- (3) That the Convener of Citizenship and Community Service be a member of the P.E.I. Temperance Federation.
- (4) That the Eastern Presbytery go on record as protesting the increasing practise of radio programs offering jack-pots and prizes.
- (5) That our appreciation be extended to Rev. MacKay and all other members that took part.

It was moved and seconded that the resolutions be adopted as read.

A very interesting report was given by Anna Matheson, on the Y.P.U. Conference held at Halifax on Thanksgiving week-end. An explanation of the Shield Competition was given by Rev. Howard Christie, Hunter River, in which he urged all Unions to participate.

Following the business period, Miss Phyllis Coffin of Charlottetown rendered very beautifully "Bless This House".

Rev. A. S. Weir, honorary president, Maritime Conference, spoke briefly on the Y. P. U. work and on the Rally.

The guest speaker for the evening was Rev. John MacKay, who chose for his text Deuteronomy 30:19. He said, "I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing, therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live." He said that God is showing us the way, but He is not determining our choice.
