

Birchwood Home And School Hears Report From Principal

The Birchwood Home and School Association held its first meeting in the school auditorium Wednesday with a large number of parents in attendance. Frank MacIntyre was elected vice-president and delegates were appointed to attend a semi-annual meeting of the P.E.I. Federation in Kensington to be held in the second week of November.

Lt.-Col. L.F. MacDonald, the principal, reported there were 48 boys and 318 girls in attendance for a total of 777 pupils. The staff numbered 33, with 11 changes from last year. He said 149 students last year left the school to further their education elsewhere, while 37 moved into the labor force, and 25 of the latter were from grade seven and eight and 22 from grade nine and 10.

He informed the meeting of the forthcoming parent-teacher interviews which will commence Nov. 25.

Souris Man Gets Two Years' Sentence On Five Convictions

James Arnold MacLean, 41, of Souris, was given two-year sentences on each of five convictions Wednesday by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Kings County magistrate's court here. The sentences, which will be served concurrently in Dorchester Penitentiary, were for charges of unlawfully escaping custody at Riverside Hospital, uttering a forged document, and false pretences at Geider's Garage, Jay's Service Station, and the Village Diner, all in Morell. MacLean had previously pleaded not guilty to the "uttering" charge, but yesterday changed his plea to guilty.
