Pownal Minister United Church Conference President

SACKVILLE, June 13 — Rev. Andrew Stewart Weir of Pownal, P. E. Island was chosen as President of the Maritime Conference of the United Church at a session of the annual meeting here today.

Rev. Mr. Weir was born in Greenwood School District, Pictou Co., Nova Scotia, a few miles from the Town of New Glasgow. He received his earlier education in the Greenwood Public School. He afterwards attended the New Glasgow High School.

He took his Arts work at Dalhousie University and his Theology at Pine Hill, Halifax, graduating from that College in 1908. His first congregation was at Merigomish, N. S., and he was ordained in the church there by the Presbytery of Pictou, July 18th, 1908.

He has also held pastorates in Manitoba, Wallace, N. S., and New Richmond, Quebec. He has spent more than twenty three of the past twenty four years in Prince Edward Island, holding pastorates at Alberton, Orwell-Vernon and presently at Pownal, to which place he was called two years ago.

He has been chairman of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island and is at present its Treasurer. He has also been chairman of the general work of the Church. For several years he has been Chairman of the Settlement Committee of the Maritime Conference, acting also as a member of the Transfer Committee of the church in Canada.

There were four nominations for the presidency. Others were Rev. F. E. Archibald, Moncton, N. B., Rev. D. B. Earle, St. Stephen, N. B., and Rev. J. A. Forbes, Fredericton.

Rev. James A. Fraser of Imperial, N. S., was re-elected secretary, and Rev. E. D. Murray of Halifax, assistant secretary. In the report of the retiring president, outlining activities of the conference during the year, was given by Rev. W. S. Godfrey.

Double Train Service Begins On June 25

MONCTON, N. B., June 13 — The double train service, daily except Sunday, between Prince Edward Island and the mainland will go into effect on Monday, June 25th, according to announcement by F. L. Dougan, general passenger agent of the Canadian National Railway.

In addition to the train service now operating, leaving Charlottetown at 7:00 A. M., Summerside 7:15 A. M., connecting with the Scotian at Moncton for Montreal, Toronto and points west, also with train for Saint John, a train will leave Charlottetown at 2:10 P. M., Summerside 1:45 P. M., arriving Sackville 7:00 P. M., where connections will be made with the Maritime Express for Montreal, Toronto and points west, also Saint John.

From the mainland, train leaves Moncton at 11 A. M., arriving Charlottetown 6:10 P. M., Summerside 5:50 P. M., and, in addition, a train will leave Moncton at 4:40 P. M., arriving Charlottetown 10:30 P. M., Summerside 10:15 P. M.

The through air conditioned sleeper between Montreal and Charlottetown will continue to be operated on the Scotian, being attached to train leaving Charlottetown at 7:00 A. M., and in the opposite direction, will arrive Charlottetown 10:30 P. M.

Between Summerside and Borden, effective June 25, a train will leave Summerside at 1:45 P. M., arrive Borden 4:00 P. M., and will leave Borden at 8:45 P. M., arriving Summerside 10:15 P. M., daily except Sunday.

Effective June 15, there will be eight trips of the car ferry operating between Borden, P. E. I., and Cape Tormentine, N. B., daily, leaving Borden and Cape Tormentine at 9:10 A. M., 10:35 A. M., 1:00 P. M., 2:50 P. M., 4:30 P. M., 7:30 P. M., 9:00 P. M., and 10:30 P. M.

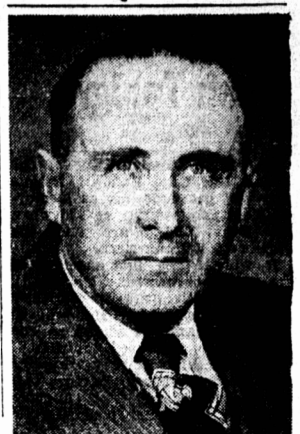
