Fish And Game Program Is Underway In Queens

The dam building program for Queens County sponsored by the Queens County Branch Fish and Game Association has finally gotten underway. At a meeting of the Branch early this spring Dr. Wendell MacDonald the President announced he had received a promise of one thousand dollars from the Hon. Dugald MacKinnon, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources to be used for the purpose of constructing dams for public fishing. Incidentally a like grant was placed at the disposal of Kings and Prince Counties. As a member of the Fish Committee he asked me if I would consent to supervise the construction of such dams. Rather rashly, as I now can see, I promised to do just that. I made this promise after I was assured by Anson MacLaughlin who has charge of the machines for the Department of Agriculture that he would place one of his best Bull Dozers and two of his top operators at my disposal when I was ready to start. The program in Queens got underway at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday July 25th. One has to wait until the soil is dry enough to pack otherwise it will spread beneath the weight of the dozer. So far two dams have been completed with two others next in line. The first was constructed at Johnson's River and is known as the Mark Brazil Dam. The second is the Shaw MacMillan dam at Alberry Plains named after the late Mr. MacMillan. Both are reel top notch dams and should afford excellent future sport for the angling fraternity.

A BIT NERVOUS
I was a little nervous about tackling the MacMillan dam as it had a bad past record for breaking out. It drains a large area and during spring thaws the freshet runs like a river on the rampage. After I watched the dozer operators, Chester MacSwain and William Green, do their stuff on the Brazil dam I felt much easier in mind. On Wednesday afternoon I was in a group of local farmers who were watching the dozer in operation at Alberry Plains when one of the party remarked: "Those boys sure know their stuff" I replied, "Anse promised to give me his best dozer and two of his best men". "He sure kept his promise" was the comment. When Dr. Wen and Dr. Prowse viewed the finished Mark Brazil dam Doctor MacDonald remarked: "That's a terrific job." Doctor Prowse: "One thing is certain it will not go out". My own personal opinion is that it will be a honey for trout. Its deep, shaded and the water is ice cold, a setup dear to a trout's heart.

The MacMillan ran into more money than the Brazil dam even though the embankment was there except for a large gap in the middle. Experience has taught that it is not safe to trust old embankments and this break was studded with sections of old steel rails and a huge section of concrete held in place by upright steel rails was squarely in the middle of the break. New fill was placed in front and after this was done the gap stood out like a missing tooth. We decided to fill it also and this change showed up other defects. Some landscaping was in order and the heavy growth of trees between the dam embankment and the highway shut out the view and this space was cleared. This in turn brought to our attention the need of a parking lot on some fill between this and the pavement. It reminded me of the "Tale without an end" but I feel when you view the result you will consider the changes worth while even at additional cost.

CO-OPERATION
These dams are the result of co-operation between the Departments of Agriculture and Natural Resources as well as Anse MacLaughlin and the operators of the machine. They were thorough and efficient. All one had to do was point out what was to be done and it was done in a manner that showed they knew their work. Billed down to its last analysis its our Minister of Industry and Resources the Hon. Dugald MacKinnon whom trout fishermen want to thank when they are enjoying trout fishing on these public fishing dams and it cannot be said that he had an ear to grind when he agreed to Dr. Wen MacDonald's request for assistance in building dams. Furthermore he showed his interest by visiting both dam sites and expressing his thanks to the builders. I understand that southern Kings expect to build a couple of dams shortly. In the words of May West: "Come up and see us sometime."

WANTS 20-ROUND FIGHT

Aging Champ Is Irked By Durelle's Comment

MONTREAL (CP) — Archie Moore, back in training for his twice-postponed light-heavyweight fight with Yvon Durelle, says he'd like to see the fight go 20 rounds.

That was the aging champion's comment Wednesday when he read a newspaper story which quoted Durelle as feeling "sort of sorry for Moore."

The story, an interview with Durelle at his Moncton training headquarters, said the challenger thought the heat would murder a man Moore's age (about 40) and that he would probably collapse after five or six rounds of their Aug. 12 bout at the Montreal Forum, which is scheduled for 15 rounds.

"I tell you what I'd like to do," Moore said after reading the story, "I'd like to have the commission lengthen this fight out to a 20-rounder, just to show that little squirt I can go a longer route than he can."

"I'm going to ask that," he said, "and if permission is granted I'll give Durelle the lesson and the beating of his life. I won't try to knock him out in a hurry, just carry him along and make him suffer... these old man cracks get under my skin."

Observers thought the champion looked just about as well as he talked.

In earlier training there was speculation Moore might have trouble making the 175 pound limit, but he now weighs about 181, and there seemed little danger he could not take off the remaining six pounds within the next two weeks.

The return match was first scheduled for July 15 and then postponed until July 29 after Moore bruised his heel in training. The second postponement was forced when Moore had to rush back to his home in San Diego, Calif., to be with his wife after a delicate operation.

Commission officials could not be reached for comment on the matter of lengthening the bout.

Temperatures have been close to 100 degrees in the Montreal gym where Moore has been working out since returning.

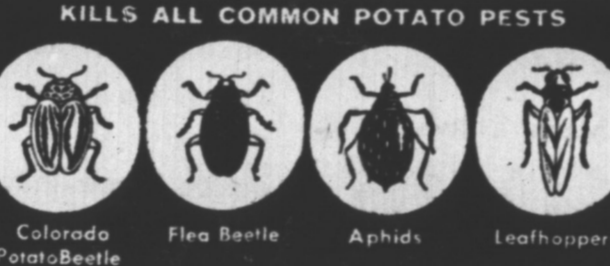
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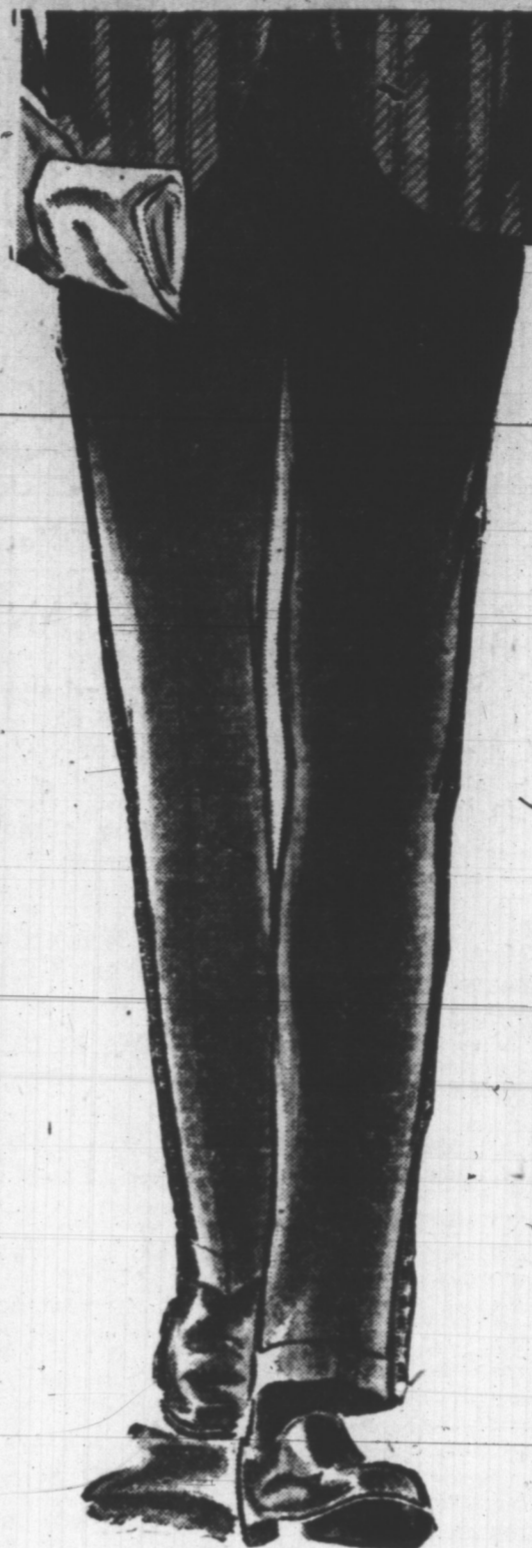
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
