

OWEN HAMIL, Esq.—The following short obituary notice of this gentleman reached us too late for the last issue of our journal.

We regret to record the death of Owen Hamil, Esq., Architect, who had spent some years in the Colchester County, at two o'clock, Wednesday, 12th inst.

There has been a discussion in the public journals respecting the dismissal from the Papal service of several volunteers, Irishmen, for improper conduct.

This report we find confirmed in the Irish American, a Fenian organ of New York, by a letter dated Rome, 3rd ult.

The preparations were well completed when tidings having reached the Pope's ears, Monsignor Talbot, the Papal Chamberlain, immediately sent a warning to the priest against allowing his church to be used for the intended demonstration.

The steamers Commerce and Alhambra, of the Boston and Colonial Steamship Line, will be placed on the route between this port, Boston, Charlestown and Plaister Cove, sometime in March.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

JANUARY 29, 1868.—Present—His Worship the Mayor, Councillors Morris, Reddin, Pollard, Laird, Hooper, Yates, Mitchell, Brecken and Batchelor.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. His Honor the Recorder laid before the meeting his opinion, in writing, respecting the office of Assayer of Weights and Measures, and stated that he had given the Assayer certain instructions respecting his duties generally.

On motion of Councillor Yates, seconded by Councillor Mitchell, it was ordered that instructions be given to the City Surveyor to make a Survey of the City Wharfs, and report on the present condition of the same, accompanied by an estimate of necessary repairs to place the said wharfs in a like condition as when leased to Silas Barnard.

Councillor Morris, from the Committee appointed to examine an account of W. & D. Fraser, for finishing the Market Hall, presented the Report of said Committee, which was read and ordered to be laid on the table, and was to the effect that the said Committee had examined as far as possible, the accounts in question, and found that the sum of £73 13s. 3d. was charged for extra work, although a sum not exceeding £20 was all that had been voted by the Board for the extra work to be performed.

After some discussion on the subject, the Council adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

CITY COUNCIL, 30th JAN.—Council met pursuant to adjournment. After the minutes of the previous day were read and approved, the Board resumed the consideration of the report of the Committee on the account of Messrs. Fraser, for completion of Market Hall, when, upon motion of Councillor Laird, it was ordered that the sum of Eighty-nine pounds be granted and paid to Messrs. Fraser in full, for their contract, including extra work, reserving nine pounds of said amount until the painting be finished.

Councillor Laird, Chairman of the Committee appointed at a former meeting of Council, to report on the necessity of establishing a Poor & Work House in Charlestown, presented the Report of said Committee, accompanied by a draft Memorial proposed to be laid before the Legislature at the ensuing Session.

On motion of Councillor Mitchell, seconded by Councillor Reddin, it was ordered that said Report be received, and that His Worship the Mayor be requested to cause the said Memorial to be engrossed and forwarded to the Lieutenant Governor in Council, together with an early day.

On motion, it was ordered that instructions be given to the City Surveyor to cause the Cellar Hatches in the burnt district, Ward No. 1, of this City, to be securely and permanently filled forthwith.

The Clerk read a communication from Thos. Alley, Esq., Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, relative to the Water Tank at the corner of Kent and Prince Streets; also read an account and application from P. Gormley for the balance of the contract for said tank, and that his account for extra charges be laid on the table until the Chief Engineer shall certify that the said tank is made water-tight.

An amendment to said resolution was submitted on motion of Councillor Mitchell, seconded by Councillor Hooper, as follows:—That the said contractor be paid the balance of his original contract, when the certificate of the Chief Engineer, to the completion of the work to the satisfaction of that officer, be laid before the Board.

The Chief Engineer having submitted a further certificate respecting the said water tank, to the effect that the work had been completed to his satisfaction, it was, on motion, ordered that the balance of £31 2s due on the contract, be paid forthwith.

ST. PETER'S BAY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—A large and influential meeting of the principal farmers of the Second District of King's County, was held at the store of Anthony McCormack, Esq., Head of St. Peter's Bay, on Saturday last, the 29th of February, for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of establishing an Agricultural Society in the district. The liveliest interest was manifested in the

project by those present, and judging from their standing, intelligence, and determination, there is little doubt but that the Society will be worked out vigorously to the advantage of the District and County generally.

Martin McInnis, Esq., having been appointed Chairman, the Members of the District (Messrs McCormack and Reilly) addressed the Meeting, as also did Hilary McIsaac and James Hogan, Esqs., and other gentlemen, upon the benefits to be derived from the establishment of Agricultural Societies, and the scientific prosecution of farming. A letter was read from the Hon. Geo. Deer, wherein that gentleman proposed to become a member of the Society, and I threw out some valuable suggestions as to the use of lime and manure, which were well received.

A code of Rules and Regulations were submitted, and after some amendment, were approved of. The following gentlemen were appointed office-bearers of the St. Peter's Bay Agricultural Society, until the Second Wednesday in July next, namely:— Patron—James Hogan, Esq. President—Martin McInnis, Esq. Vice-President—Mr. Jas. McKay. Sec'y and Treas.—Anthony McCormack, Esq. M.P.P. Committee—Hilary McIsaac, David Lewis, and J. R. McKinnon, Esqs., Messrs. John Hughes, Robert Anderson, John McIntyre, John Ryan, Norman Matheson, and Peter McAnally.

A vote of thanks was then passed to Mr. Reilly for his trouble in organizing the Society and preparing rules for its government. A vote was also passed to the Hon. Geo. Deer for the suggestions and propositions contained in his letter, after which, Messrs. McCormack and Reilly having been instructed to apply to the Legislature for an Act of Incorporation and a grant of money in aid of the Society, the meeting broke up, highly pleased with the proceedings, and anticipating the most satisfactory results from the proper management of the Society.

A large number of names, accompanied by the subscription required by the Rules, were handed in to the Secretary, foremost among which, as in every other good work and reform, is that of His Lordship the Bishop of Charlestown.

CHARLOTTETOWN DEBATING CLUB.—On Friday evening last, the question, "Had the Nova Scotia Parliament the power, constitutionally, without an appeal to the people, to assent to Confederation; and are the people justified, under existing circumstances, in suing for a repeal of the Union?" was opened by Mr. Robert Shaw, who was of the opinion that the Representatives of Nova Scotia had the Constitutional power of assenting to Confederation without an appeal to the people, and cited the highest constitutional authorities in support of that measure.

Some who took part in the discussion that followed, held the opposite opinion, and maintained that the representative acted merely as a trustee for his constituents and as such could not depute or assign that trust to others, and that not only had he no right to pass any measure which his successors could not repeal, but that he must resign the trust committed into his hands unimpaired to those from whom he derived it, which arguments were also supported by numerous authorities.

As to the second part of the question, there were those who thought that although there may be no doubt as to the constitutional power, there are cases (and the one under discussion is one,) in which the Representative has no moral right to exercise such power, however constitutional.

As many of the members had not an opportunity of expressing their opinion on the subject, on motion of Mr. Laird, the discussion was adjourned until Friday evening next.

Abstracted from Registers of Normal School. Term commencing Sep. 2nd, 1867. No. of Students: Females, 19, Males, 25—Total, 44. Pupils taught by Masters: Females, 3, Males, 11—Total, 14. Total in Mr. Webster's room: Females, 22, Males 35—Total 57. Total in Miss McKinnon's Room: Girls, 44, Boys, 13—Total 57. Totals: Females, 66, Males, 49—115; of these 115, 33—all Students, are from the country; the remaining 77, reside in the city.

The hours are, in summer, from 9 to 12, and from 2 to 4; in winter, from 9 to 2.

The No. of teaching days in the year, is about 215; in the week, about 5.

There is no model School. The Students take turns in assisting Miss McKinnon, one being always with her. The Students also practise teaching, to a considerable extent, in their own room, under the eye of the master, in instructing the pupils there, as well as one another.

The system is Stowe's System, as it now exists in Stowe's original institution in Glasgow, so far as our circumstances admit.

The Students and pupils do sit in the same department. There is space enough for the No. in attendance, and as long as there are only two teachers, two rooms are sufficient; a good Model School, with two or three departments, is required to make the P. E. Island Normal School worthy of the name.
