

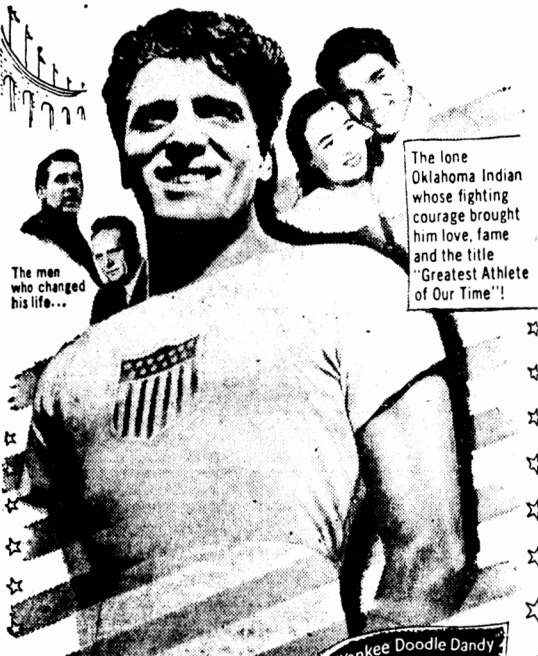

St. Teresa's Credit Union

St. Teresa's Credit Union members held their annual meeting in the parish hall, St. Teresa's, on Tuesday evening, October 9th. The meeting was attended by a good representation of the young people of the district, some of whom were appointed to the different executive offices for the coming year.

The president, Mr. M. J. Kelly, presided over the meeting, and in his report, gave a detailed account of credit union activity during the past year, and expressed his hopes, aspirations, policies for the year coming up.

The following officers were re-elected: directors, Harry Trainor, James Campbell; credit committee, Joseph Smith; supervisory committee, Ernie Bradley. The new appointments to these offices were: directors, Joseph Lawlor, Harry Trainor (reappointed); credit committee, Amos Dunphy; supervisory committee, Francis Gormley.

It was decided that 3 per cent dividends would be paid on share capital for the past year. It was also passed that League dues be taken out of undivided earnings for members who have not yet reached their sixteenth birthday.

The treasurer, St. Clair Dunphy, was complemented for the work that he had done in the interests of the credit union, and it was felt that more active support from the officers and membership in general would lessen his burdens and also increase outside interest.

Other speakers at the meeting were Fr. J. B. Croken, parish priest at St. Teresa's, J. J. MacIsaac, fieldman for credit unions, and A. J. MacAdam, St. Dunstan's University.

When the business of the meeting was completed, films were shown to the gathering.
