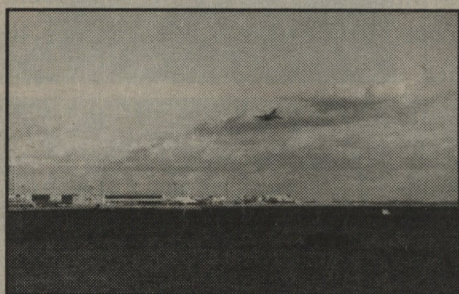


← Seat By Matthew Dorrell Sale →

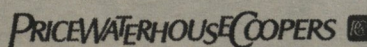
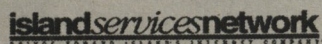
