THE VALE COLLIERY FIRE.—The Vale colliery has been shut down indefinitely. It was impossible to quench the fire, and the manager decided to shut down. Between 300 and 400 men have been thrown out of work. Some eight horses and a quantity of mining plant were destroyed, among the latter being a pump valued at \$3,000. The New Glasgow iron works will feel the loss keenly, as the coal from this mine was exactly suited for their purposes. It is likely another shaft, opened some time ago, but abandoned on account of the poor quality of the coal, will be further developed.

At a meeting held at the Campbell House, Summerside, on Friday evening last, for the purpose of arranging for a futurity stakes for foals of 1888, to be trotted this coming fall, it was decided to pass rules that would govern the stakes and appoint a Board of Directors, whose duty as a body it would be to conduct the business in connection with the successful carrying out of the project. A resolution was adopted, deciding that the stakes be called the P. E. Island Futurity Stakes for foals of 1888 bred or raised in the Province; that the entrance fee be \$12.00, to be paid as follows: \$4.00 on 1st day of March next, at which time the nominations close; \$4.00 on 1st May, when the breeding and ownership of each nomination must be handed to the Secretary and the colt named,—final payment to be made thirty days prior to race, which must be held during the month of September of this year. It was decided not to admit pacers. Mr. Richard Hunt was chosen President of the Board of Directors, James McLeod, Vice-President; Messrs. J. A. Gourlie, James Tuplin, Alder Black, Harry Craswell, members of the Board, and W. A. Brennan, Secretary.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Trouble Brewing.

LONDON, Jan. 5.

The government has received intelligence of the safety of Johnston, British Consul at Mozambique, travelling in the interior of Africa, who is charged by the Portuguese papers with having intrigued with natives against the Portuguese in the territory along the Shire river. Johnston has pacified the Korangese and subsidized Kolokota by treaty, securing Western Uyassa to the British. The Portuguese have reached Kalungga, where the remaining Makololos, trusting to British protection, refused to surrender the British flag presented to them when called upon to do so by the Portuguese commander. The Portuguese thereupon again searched the steamers and compelled them to lower the ensign. Fighting in Africa, it is believed, will be certain. The African Lakes Company, of Glasgow, has telegrams from its agents of the same tenor as our report, adding that the Portuguese crossed the river and boarded the company's steamers and hauled down the British flag.

Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.

The Mayoralty contest will be decided to-morrow. The chances are in favor of the re-election of Mayor Eratt. The plans, profiles and estimates of the Harvey Salisbury Railway are nearly completed and will be laid before Parliament at the opening of this session. It is stated that the Minister of Militia intends introducing a bill this session to adopt the pension system to officers and men of the permanent corps throughout Canada. The system will be similar to that recently adopted regarding the Mounted Police.

A Disastrous Gale.

LONDON, Jan. 5.

A gale has been raging all over Great Britain to-day. Much damage has been done throughout the country and many wrecks are reported. The Protestant Church at Bur Island was struck by lightning and badly damaged. The Cunard str. Umbria is at Queenstown for repairs. The gale was very severe on the Irish coast. At Killarney two women were killed by a falling tree.

The Government Displeased.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 5.

The Russian Government is displeased with the restrictions of the Turkish Government in regard to Crete, and have requested the Porte to extend amnesty to everyone in the island, and abolish the state seige.

Some Snow.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 5.

Telegraphic reports state that the fall of snow on the Sierra Nevada Mountains, on the line of the Central Pacific Railway, is unprecedented. At the summit this afternoon it is sixteen feet on the level.

To be Expelled.

LONDON, Dec. 5.

A Times Lisbon correspondent says a Brazilian paper reports the government at Rio Janeiro intends to expel the Russian envoy in consequence of Russia's refusal to recognize the republic.

Honors in Prospective.

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 5.

It is authentically stated that within a year Archbishop Ireland, of St. Paul, will be invested with the Cardinal's hat and made Papal Legate for the United States.

Yellow Fever.

LONDON, Jan. 5.

Private despatches from Rio Janeiro say intensely hot weather prevails there, and that yellow fever of the most malignant type has appeared in the city.

Harbor Improvements.

MONTREAL, Jan. 6.

The expenditure of one million dollars on harbor improvements and flood prevention has been sanctioned by a public vote.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 5.

Daniel P. Flewelling, aged 23, while skating to church on the St. John River this morning, went through the ice and was drowned.
