## Among The Farmers

Federation of Agriculture News

**Margarine Again**

The recent decision of the Privy Council that the Dominion Government does not have authority to enforce a nation-wide ban on margarine and that this is a provincial matter does not simplify the problem very much.

At the present time we have everything from complete freedom to complete bans and varying shades of regulation and control.

Butter, which is manufactured according to strict standards imposed by the Dominion Government, must now compete with a product for which no uniform standards are set.

To Senator Euler goes the dubious honor of having initiated an agitation, the result of which will be lower nutritional standards for our people, and lower incomes for the producers of churning cream and they have always been the Cinderella of Canadian Agriculture.

Our dairy farmers have pursued a system of agriculture which resulted in the maintenance and improvement of soil fertility, a matter of extreme importance to our national welfare and one which is rapidly becoming a national problem.

On the other hand the profits of big business will be increased and millions of dollars will leave the country to pay for the importation of vegetable oils from foreign countries.

In short the Canadian dairy farmer will be penalized to the advantage of farmers in other parts of the world.

These are, of course, practical implications which law courts cannot be expected to take into consideration.

The Canadian people and Canadian economy can be expected to benefit little, if at all from the substitution of a wholesome domestic product with margarine manufactured from imported oils.

**Improved Sire Policy**

We have received a copy of the Improved Sire Policy for pure bred cattle now in effect in the province of Nova Scotia.

This policy which provided grants up to \$300.00 per animal is claimed to have produced a distinct improvement in Nova Scotian cattle. Certainly it has been the means of farmers financing the purchase of a better class of sires than would otherwise have been possible.

**Federation Activities**

County Federation directors have already held meetings in King's and Queen's Counties and the directors will meet in Summerside next Thursday night. As stated before it is planned to hold the annual meetings in mid-November and the school district meetings will be held throughout the province on the night of November 10th. It is not too soon for the members to start making plans and interesting their neighbors who are not members in supporting the Federation.

Agriculture is not out of the woods and indeed we can foresee some very important problems coming up. Agriculture, before the development of the Federation, was in no position to compete with capital and organized labor for a fair share of the national income. During the past fifteen years while everything may not have been entirely satisfactory, yet conditions in general have improved and much of this improvement is due to the activities of the Federation of Agriculture in this Country.

A strong Federation of Agriculture is in a position to negotiate with Governments on behalf of the farmer and to influence public opinion by reasonable policies.

**Experiment With Corn Varieties**

During the past summer four Kings County farmers carried out tests to determine the relative qualities of different strains of hybrid corn. The ones tested were Canada Numbers 56, 35, 531, 150 250, and also a first generation cross, Canbred.

Number 56 gave what appeared to be a heavier growth but did not ear up well and when blown into the silo was lacking in substance.

Numbers 35 and 531 which have been widely offered for sale while quite satisfactory were not as good as 250 which eared up the best and gave a better growth of fodder as well.

Canbred was a variety which was hoped would mature sufficiently well to provide seed and a sample of the ears are being dried to find out whether it will grow next spring.

**Automobile Insurance**

A great many farmers carry fire and life insurance. We wonder what proportion protect themselves with automobile accident insurance and with public liability insurance in particular.

With ever-increasing traffic on our highways the possibility of being involved in accidents and becoming liable for damages is a very real one.

The fund established by the Provincial Government is used only to pay judgments where the responsible party has no assets of value.
