OLD HABIT, NEW WRAPPER

This is a reproduction of an interesting editorial which appeared recently. It pokes a few holes, with good-natured intent, in the current proneness of dentists to apply blanket indictment on sugar as the cause of dental decay. THE GLOBE AND MAIL, SATURDAY, MAY 20, 1950. Dentists of this continent are now out on an anti-sweets campaign. Their purpose was made plain by speakers to the Canadian Dental Association meeting here. These gentlemen spoke of "caries-inducing" foods and "inhibitions of acid reaction" and unanimously blamed high carbohydrate diet for the poor state of North American teeth. Diverged of its scientific language, this mainly means a boycott of the cookie jar, the candy bowl, the soft drink and other products of the sugar bar. Yet apparently forsaking their own teaching, dental experts are now prepared to apply a blanket indictment of sugar. We recall the citrus fruit craze of the Twenties, which may have injured more constitutions than it helped. While eating food consumed so very different from the cake ings, the home-made fudge, the molasses taffy. Making candy was not only a dietary habit, but the basis of a social evening. How has the assumption changed? Simply in the distribution. The kitchen has given place to the "soda-bar."
