Let's Talk It Over

William Hard's "The Road Ahead in the Light of the H-Bomb" which appeared in Reader's Digest should be translated into all languages and distributed among the leaders of every nation. Not so much for its specific proposals for combating Russia's dream of world domination, as for its over-all philosophy of living and letting live in this perpetual "cold war" that is gripping the earth. The author points out that the better translation of what the angels said over Bethlehem is "Peace on earth to men of good will" (stressing the last five words). Not only God, but man must have good will before peace can be achieved on earth.

An aggressive policy of halting Communism will never get us out of our present difficulties, the author implies. Of course, provisions must be made to keep the threat of Communism within bounds, but good will towards all nations should be our watchword, the driving force behind all our actions.

To many people, including large numbers within the United States, the regime of President Eisenhower has been a bit disappointing. They expected vigorous, swash-buckling action from the great soldier, but Eisenhower is essentially a man of peace. There is probably plenty of strength behind Eisenhower's velvet glove. Snarling and making faces are not really indications of strength at all. Britain's Anthony Eden is apparently another statesman who believes that while appeasement has been proved disastrous good will is still necessary to achieve peace on earth.
