Business Spotlight

An encouraging note for traders is given in the current Monthly Letter of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. It says:

"There are indications that improvement in the gold and dollar reserves of the sterling area may permit some relaxation of British duty in the dollar imports announced last September. In addition, it appears that Canadian exporters may look forward to some lessening of restrictions in the British West Indies."

This might do something to remedy the situation of the first half of the year when exports to Britain dropped substantially. Fortunately, this drop was caused by higher exports to the United States and greater consumption at home. At the same time the Bank notes that imports from Britain have not risen to levels which might have been expected to result from the cheaper prices of post-devaluation merchandise.

Announcements

Public bond financing for July totalled \$10,202,031, about half July's figure last year, says Wood, Gundy and Co., Ltd. The decline was accounted for primarily by the absence of provincial issues.

Total public financing in the first seven months of 1950 was \$1,139,85,648, compared with \$239,635,510 in the same period last year. Bulk of the increase was the Government of Canada \$745,000,000 refunding loan in May.

Confederation Life Association announced the retirement of C. D. Devline, vice-president and general manager. He will continue as vice-president of the board of directors. Four new vice-presidents are: B. T. Holmes, actuary; J. L. McLachlan, secretary; A. E. Wall, in charge of agencies; W. J. Farmery, in charge of investments.

London, July — (CP) — Fashion bouquets at this year's Buckingham Palace Garden Party went to Overseas guests.

Newspapers picked Dominion visitors as wearing the most eye-catching styles. Freda Northrop of Canada, in a yellow dress edged with white plique, introduced cotton to Garden Party styles.

She was singled out by The Daily Graphic as a "Fashion Pioneer." Pat Perkins of Sydney, Australia, wore a lacy black picture hat, black gloves, and a yellow taffeta dress edged with lace, on the large hip pockets, the tiny puff sleeves and the low round neck.

Another Australian, Margaret Croker, wore what was described as the cheapest hat ever worn at

the Garden Party, and one of the prettiest. It was a small, pale blue grosgrain cloche which cost one pound. (\$3.10). A French guest chose an elegant silver-grey lace dress with fan-tail of pleated lace cascading down one side, worn with a huge picture hat. The longest dresses were ankle length, in lace, georgette and organdy, worn mostly by older women. The younger set favored long calf-lengths, in everything from froths of candy-striped muslin to severely tailored dove-grey grosgrain.

Queen's Costume

The Queen wore rose pink printed chiffon with cross-over neckline and straight skirt. A long panelled cape flowed from the shoulders, almost to the ankles, and a stiffened pink tulle hat swept sideways in gigantic "mothwings."

Princess Margaret wore a rainbow organdy skirt with short, ice-blue silk jacket and a huge halo picture hat with transparent brim. Parasols are again becoming Garden-Party style. In place of big

picture hats they give glamor without trouble in a high wind, and are not as trothy and fluffy as they were in grandmother's day.

The Queen carried a white parasol with dark lining and a long dark handle.

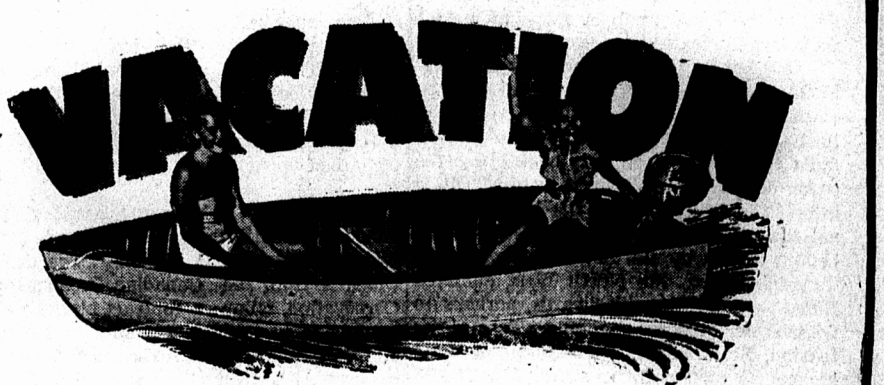
