# Canadian Economy Growing Faster Than That Of U.S.

OTTAWA (CP) — The United States economy is vastly bigger but the one in Canada is growing faster. And what's more, Canadian speed is picking up. So concluded the bureau of statistics Tuesday in a special comparison of the two economies over the post-war period and especially over the last three years. In the seven years of 1946-53, Canadian national production increased by 104 per cent; the U.S. by only 74. In 1953-56, the Canadian increase was 22 per cent. In the U.S. it was only 14. But in a way it is like comparing peanuts with elephants for the American economy is about 15 times the size of Canada's. And so while U.S. production more than doubled, the figures may be a bit more impressive. American national production rose to \$412,400,000,000 in 1956 from \$209,200,000,000 in 1946. Canadian production increased to \$29,900,000,000 from \$12,000,000,000. SPECTACULAR RISE. Nevertheless the Canadian rise has been spectacular and the bureau had this to say: "The gap between the rates of growth in real output, which had been considerably higher in Canada, has widened perceptibly in the past two years. Investment in durable assets had been a higher proportion of gross national product—value of all goods and services produced—in Canada than in the U.S.; this disparity is now accentuated. "The rate of increase in real wages has been higher in Canada than in the U.S. but since 1953 real wages have shown the same advance in both countries. "The pattern of recovery from recession, with the strategic role of consumer expenditure and a closely related sector—housing—was the same in the two countries. DYNAMIC FACTOR. "With the accumulating affects of resource development, in the past year investment was a more dynamic factor in Canada than in the U.S. and indications are that it will continue to be in the current year. "Canada's accomplishments were achieved with a population that increased in 1956 to 16,100,000 from 12,300,000 in 1946. In that

The present boat is 32 ft. 4 inches long, with a 8 ft 10 in beam and is 5 ft. 6 in. in depth. She has a draught of 10 in. forward and 23 in. aft. Into her construction went 3500 running feet of New Brunswick spruce plank. She is what is known as strip plank style, with the planks measured one and three-quarter in. by thirteen by sixteen inch. The timbers, which are of elm and juniper, are placed with 8 in. Centers. The keel is of white Oak, as is the deadwood and stem. She has a tumble-in-stern-6 ft. wide and the washboards are 14 inches in width. An 8 cylinder Buick engine will provide ample power. The engine is housed in an engine house constructed of plywood. The boat will be painted grey, with a red water line and black ribbons and presents a fine appearance and will enhance an already fine fishing fleet, sailing out of this famous harbour. AC
