The amount of Dominion notes in circulation on June 30 was \$20,661,719. The Empire remarks that in connection with the issue is an illustration of the careful manner in which our financial administration, Parliament's Act of session, authorizing an issue of \$25,000,000 of Dominion notes, did not contain the provision which had appeared in the resolutions passed by the House on which the Act was founded—that any issue of Dominion notes over twenty million dollars should not be made unless gold equal to the additional issue were available for redemption of the notes. "By some oversight," says Mr. Courtney in his report to the minister, "this condition does not appear in the Act, but not only has it been strictly adhered to by the Department, this is safe, conservative management, indicating a prudent regard for the absolute safety of our currency."
