At 10 o'clock on Saturday morning, three young men, Rev. Edwin B. Steele of Charlottetown, Rev. Clarence Roche of Iona and Rev. Charles MacDonald of Launceston, were ordained to the Priesthood in St. Dunstan's Basilica by His Excellency James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown.

His Excellency was assisted by Rev. Francis Corcoran and Rev. Francis Bolger, with Rev. P. F. MacDonald Master of Ceremonies.

Rev. Fr. MacDonald was assisted by Rev. Bennett MacDonald, Rev. Fr. Roche by Rev. Edmund Roche and Rev. Fr. Steele by Rev. J. W. McCordie.

Father Steele celebrated his first solemn High Mass at 11 o'clock yesterday morning with Rev. Francis Corcoran as Deacon and Rev. Francis Bolger as Sub Deacon.

Miss Bethany McDonald, A. R. C. T. talented young pianist who is well known to music lovers here, was enthusiastically applauded for her brilliant performances last evening as she presented her graduate recital at Notre Dame Academy Auditorium.

Miss McDonald, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard McDonald, 107 Brighton Road, is leaving for Toronto in the late summer to enroll in the senior school established at the Royal Conservatory to prepare a limited number of gifted advanced students of music for professional careers.

LUCKY FISHERMEN - Some fishermen here all the luck. Alton Constable of Charlottetown landed himself a beauty Saturday morning in the form of a 5 1/2-pound trout. Hitting the road East early Saturday morning Alton fared out much better than most early morning anglers, who often accomplish nothing more than loss of sleep, to make the prize catch. The trout measured 22 inches in length and 12 1/2 inches at the girth, and was of the fresh water variety. WEDNESDAY

Mr. Lincoln Dewar, Secretary of the Farmers Federation received word yesterday from the Dairy farmers of Canada headquarters that the Federal Government will buy 6 1/2 million pounds of cheddar cheese at 30 cents. This refers particularly to the cheese that the Ontario Marketing Board has on hand at the moment. The Government will also buy the surplus of the make between April and September, on October 31 at 30 cents per pound. "In terms of what this means to the Island manufacturer," said Mr. Dewar, "we should be able to get at least 31 or even 32 cents a pound for our cheese."

Big Johnnie Kalmuck, the crowd pleasing favorite owned by Walter Kelly of Southport, came pacing down the stretch twice last night to nose out Babe Britton and win both dashes of the feature event in the opening night's race at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

A large crowd of fans looked on as Johnnie Kalmuck paced his way to victory with a length to spare in the first dash and then finished fast in the second race to beat Babe Britton at the wire in a finish that was decided by the camera.

Loyalty of Prince Edward Islanders to the Crown was amply demonstrated here yesterday when thousands of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's subjects attended the special Coronation Day ceremonies at the Exhibition Grounds.

The Queen's address to the people of the Commonwealth was greeted with prolonged cheering and her pleas wish that God would give her strength and wisdom to carry out her duties was echoed in the hearts of all her listeners.

One of the largest parades in years formed on King Square before moving off to the race track. In the groups were members of all military units in the city with the Recce Regiment being augmented by its Summerside squadron. Others were 28th I.A.A. Regiment, under Major D. J. McCormack; 21st Field Ambulance under Capt. Temple Hooper; and 5 Signals Regiment under Lieut. Col. K. M. Johnston. Major Earl Kennedy is in command of the P. E. I. Regiment.

Harris L. Arnold, 64, Bristol fisherman, died late Monday night as a result of a gunshot wound in the forehead above the right eye. His son, Ezra, 24, who lived at home with his father, was taken into custody by the R. C. M. Police and after questioning was lodged in Georgetown Jail. It is believed he will be arraigned in County Magistrate Joseph MacDonald's Court this morning.

The late Mr. Arnold and his wife were estranged and she had been living in Moncton. It was reported that she returned to the Province Monday and during a visit to the Bristol home a family quarrel developed. Survivors include his wife, the former Miss Nora MacLean, Bristol, two sons and five daughters. The sons are Ezra and Harrison, and the daughters are Sylvia, Mrs. Arthur Prosser, Moncton; Faith, Mrs. Gordon Reeves, Coverdale, N. B.; Joan, Mrs. Athol Dingwall, Toronto; Olga, Halifax, and Shirley, at home.

Also surviving are two brothers, James, Bristol, and Jonathan, British Columbia, and four sisters, Mrs. Lottie Mosher, Charlottetown; Mrs. Stewart Mosher, Halifax; Mrs. Ronald MacDonald, St. Peters; and Mrs. Stephen Sampson, Sydney.

Lobster fishermen of the Province are being interviewed this week by officials of the Federal Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, in an investigation of the losses suffered during the storm of last week. The investigation is under Mr. Loren Grant of the Halifax branch of the Department.

Interviewing the fishermen are Messrs. Joseph D'Andrea, Donald Buchanan and Harold Frick who started yesterday at Murray Harbour and will work their way all around the coast of the North Shore. They conferred with Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Fisheries and Natural Resources, and hope to speak individually to every fisherman.

No estimate of the total loss to fishermen through damage to gear and boats could be made because since the storm the weather has not been conducive to close examining of gear still in the water. In many cases fishermen were un-

able to put to sea to check because of high-running seas.

THURSDAY

Rev. Daniel J. Lord, S.J., lectured before a large and appreciative audience on Monday night at the Community Centre. The gifted speaker dealt with marriage and stressed the need of tolerance and approval as factors in producing a happy marriage. Speaking of family life, Father Lord explained how happier relationships could be fostered by mutual understanding.

Full of its usual vigor, the annual spring issue of the Red and White, St. Dunstan's University magazine, has made its appearance to live up to the traditions established by a long line of past editors. The contents are as widely varied as the student activities and interests with the several articles and editorials well handled.

Interesting displays of needlework, art and handicrafts were on view at Notre Dame Academy earlier this week, illustrating the excellent work done by the students in these classes during the year.

Particularly notable was the work from the art classes, which are attended by interested adults as well as Notre Dame students, including watercolours, pastels, and oil paintings, free hand drawing and work in art composition by the younger students.

Ezra Basil Arnold, 24, Bristol, was arraigned in Georgetown Court House Wednesday morning and charged with the murder of his father, Harris Leonard Arnold, on June 1. The information was sworn to by Constable John Meurant, R. C. M. Police, Souris Detachment, and read to the prisoner by County Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald. The prisoner was not represented by counsel.

The magistrate remanded him to Thursday, June 11.

The father was reported as shot in the head above the eye while he was lying in bed Monday night in his home in Bristol where he and his son resided. Earlier that evening it was reported that the deceased had had a quarrel with his estranged wife and had ended it by retiring. Some time later he was shot.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. Harold Shaw, Provincial Pathologist, and it is expected that the adjourned inquest will be held later this week on order of the Coroner, Dr. Arnold Burden. It may be held at Morell.

A signal honor was paid Wednesday night when the Prince Edward Island Medical Society gave a testimonial dinner for Dr. R. J. MacDonald, St. Peter's Bay, to mark the end of his 65th year of active practice. Dr. Roddie, as he is affectionately known to thousands, though now 95 years old took time out from his busy rounds to come to the city for the dinner in his honor.

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, chairman for the evening, said that the aim of Dr. MacDonald throughout his long life was service to the people. The guest of honor, he said, is the oldest practising physician in Canada, and possibly in the world. The chairman also paid tribute to the record of never refusing a call in the whole 65 years and cited one instance where the doctor spent an entire winter night marooned on the ice at St. Peter's Bay.

Dr. Roddie's first delivery case, a man now 65 years of age, was unable to attend the dinner last night due to ill health, his most recent delivery, a baby five weeks old, was considered too young to be present.

A representative body of residents in the Spring Park area unanimous at a meeting held in the Spring Park last evening to take the preliminary steps toward incorporation under the Village Services Act. A committee consisting of Messrs. George Lewis Edmund Arsenault, Lloyd MacNevin, Arthur McQuaid and Howard Douglas was appointed to secure the names of 25 ratepayers to a petition for presentation to the Sheriff, calling for the necessary plebiscite as required under the Act. The committee was further instructed to deal with

boundaries and any other matters necessary to the furtherance of the move for incorporation.

Anna Ling, five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Ling, Summerside, was taken to the Prince County Hospital yesterday afternoon after being struck by an R. C. A. F. panel truck at the corner of Granville and Water Streets. Dr. A. R. Grant was called to the scene of the accident and had the child removed to the hospital. Last evening the little girl was reported to be in a semi-conscious condition and suffering from concussion. Her physician stated that she had a good chance of recovery if no further complications developed. Summerside Police conducted an investigation at the scene of the accident. -S.

The home of Mr. Fred Gallant, Coleman, was completely destroyed by fire which broke out about 11:30 yesterday morning in a small building, used as a dairy, closely adjoining the main house. The house was occupied by Mrs. Gallant, her father, Mr. Andrew Arsenault, and two small children. With the assistance of neighbours practically all the contents of the dwelling were saved.

The O'Leary Fire Brigade was called but the conflagration was too far advanced by the time firemen arrived and despite their efforts both the dairy and the large house were levelled. It could not be learned if any insurance was carried.

There Ought To Be A Law
