

his success, and begged his Majesty to continue his royal protection, and freely command his services. The King, in reply, congratulated the Prince and said that he was delighted to hear that success attended his plans, and that the right man had got his long lost and paternal kingdom, assuring him of aid against his present and future enemies, and informing him that all the commanders of the Persian force in Khorasan have been strictly enjoined to watch over the welfare of his affairs and punish the disturbers of his dominion. Several messengers come from the Peshawar Sahib and proceed direct to the camp of the Amoor, who is almost in daily communication regarding the state of affairs in this quarter with the British Government.

BOKHARA, SEPT. 16.—A caravan has come from Mushiid, and reports that the son and family of the late Yar Mahomed Khan, who held the Government of Herat, have at last fallen into the snare of Persia; and Shahzadah Yusuf, descendant of the Sadozhee royal family, placed in possession of that country. The influence of Persia in Khiva since the murder of the late Khan, and the fall of Herat into the hands of Shahzadah Yusuf, and the increasing number of the Persian army in Khorasan, have given much concern to the King of Bokhara. He is so much pressed by anxiety of mind that he frequently fails in joining the Friday prayers in the Great Mosque. It is said that some natives of Khiva were saying amongst themselves that Persians and Russians were both infidels, and it was disgraceful that the present Khan allows them to be so freely intimate with him.

MURDER ON THE HIGH SEAS.—THE MURDERER SHOT IN THE RIGGING.—One of the most singular incidents connected with the annals of crime occurred on the last voyage of the ship Owen Williams, from the African coast to Liverpool. It appears that a few days after her arrival, one of the hands, John Simmonds, a Manila boy, had been guilty of some act of insubordination or theft, and to escape punishment he took to the rigging, carrying with him a marlin spike. He was summoned to descend, and on refusing to do so, a seaman was sent after him. After chasing him about the yards and shrouds for some time, he was on the point of effecting his capture, when he turned sharply round and struck him a violent blow on the head. The man fell upon the deck a corpse. The young ruffian was again summoned to surrender himself, but he persisted in maintaining his elevated position, where he remained the whole of the night. On the following morning several blank cartridges were fired at him, to intimidate him into descending, but these not having the desired effect, a loaded pistol was next fired, and the ball taking effect, he came tumbling down the rigging. The wound caused by the shot was not of a serious moment, but in the fall his collar-bone was broken, and he sustained several severe contusions. On the vessel's arrival in Liverpool he was conveyed to the Northern Hospital, where he will remain until sufficiently recovered to be handed over to the police authorities.

DECLINE IN THE PRICE OF FLOUR.—Not the least gratifying item of news which we have received by the last advices from the westward, is the notable decline in the price of this necessary article of consumption. This may be attributed, in part, to the decided disposition evinced towards peace by the belligerent Powers across the sea.—The *Athena's* news, which is two or three days later from Europe, confirms the pacific movement, and also mentions a declining market for breadstuffs on the Continent. This intelligence will probably induce a still further reduction in prices in New York.

Mr. T. B. Macaulay, the celebrated historian and member of Parliament for Edinburgh, has applied to the Chancellor of the Exchequer for the Stewardship of the Children Hundreds, or in other words has resigned his seat in the House.—The state of his health has rendered this step necessary, as he found he could not do justice to the interests of his constituents. He is suffering from an asthmatic affection, which prevents him from leaving the house at night, and from taking any exercise in the open air in inclement weather, and especially from speaking in public. The Liberal party, whose candidate Mr. Macaulay was, are making arrangements for returning Adam Black, Esq., Bookseller, and for some years Lord Provost of Edinburgh. During the last forty years he has been actively engaged in public life, and is well acquainted with the wishes and requirements of the constituency of the modern Athens.

The national debt of Russia amounts at the present moment to 1,158,988,000 silver roubles; in the year 1844 it was only 832,024,000 silver roubles.

A French company at Havre, which proposes to establish a regular service between Havre and Calcutta, has purchased eight large screw steamers from Mr. Cunard.

A Scotch paper states that the fifth volume of Mr. Macaulay's "History of England" is in the printer's hands.
