President Of Mexico Welcomed In Ottawa

By ARCH MACKENZIE Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—Ottawa broke out its ceremonial trappings Thursday to pay Mexican president Adolfo Lopez Mateos a warm welcome on a chilly fall day.

The president, his wife and 17-year-old daughter arrived by air from Washington to start a three-day official visit, first by a Mexican president in Canada.

As a 21-gun salute boomed and flags strained in a stiff breeze, the president greeted the diplomatic corps and Canadian cabinet ministers and inspected an RCAF guard of honor lined up beside the RCMP band in a polished air force hangar.

Mr. Diefenbaker, echoing the governor-general's welcome, said he himself knew of Mexico's hospitality first hand and did many other Canadians. Mexico and Canada were linked not only by material things including geography but by spiritual bonds demonstrated by mutual belief in democratic ideals.

Replying in Spanish—although he speaks English and some French—President Lopez Mateos said he views the visit as a device to strengthen ties of friendship, culture and commerce.

He noted Canada's French component and praised her foreign policy as a shining example to others in war and peace.

Thursday's rounds included the placing of a wreath at the national war memorial, signing of the visitors' books in the Commons and Senate, a call on Senate speaker Mark Drouin and another on Myor George Nelms.

Then he undertook a round of official calls broken by lunch with Governor-General Vanier. Today, a more informal tone will prevail, President Mateos is to call on Prime Minister Diefenbaker for a chat and other activities will include a drive through the Gatineau Hills, now aflame with autumn colors on the Quebec side of the Ottawa River.

The party, which includes Mexico's foreign minister, Manuel Tello, and his wife, was trailed Thursday by a group of about 50 Mexican reporters, radio and television people and a smaller number of Canadian counterparts.

The visitors are to leave Ottawa by air Saturday. Expressions of cordiality prevailed from Governor-General Vanier's first words of welcome, in which he gave assurance that Canadian hearts as well as homes were open to the visitors.

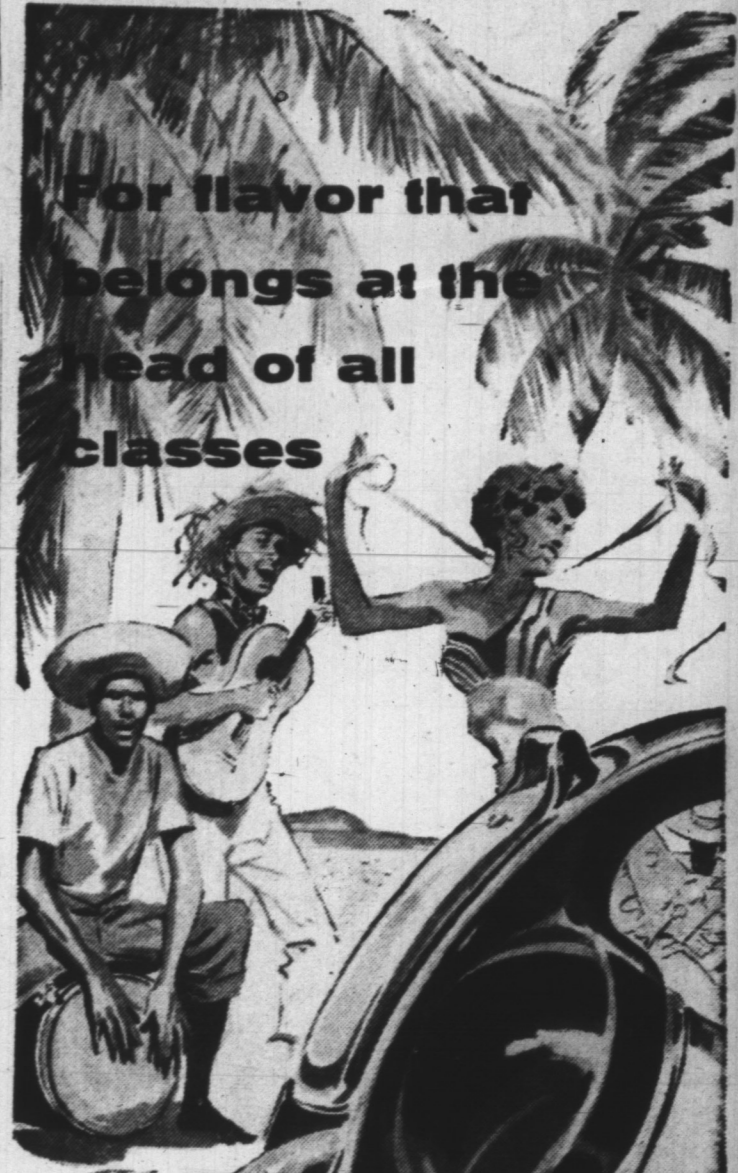
