The Islanders-Miners game scheduled for tonight at Glace Bay has been postponed for twenty-four hours by mutual agreement of the two clubs. Tonight is one of the four times in the M.M.H.L. schedule that the Miners and Islanders have been scheduled for home games on the same night and on all such occasions the Beavers play the Millionaires while the Islanders play the Miners. With both the Beavers and the Islanders being the top drawing cards, the games if played on the same night, would seriously effect one or other and possibly both of the Cape Breton Clubs from a financial standpoint.

In postponing the game the Islanders are doing the Miners quite a favor. Had they played tonight the Miners would definitely be tired after their strenuous road trip to Halifax and Charlottetown. By playing on Thursday night the Islanders will have to play three nights in a row. By Thursday night the Miners will be rested for the Islanders and they should also draw quite a crowd.

Under the circumstances the postponing of the Islanders-Miners game was the only thing that could be done. The Beavers play tomorrow night at Halifax so the postponement of the Beavers Millionaires game was out of the question. If there are any concessions to be granted it is fitting that they should be given to Glace Bay for they are the ones who have been filling the Forum here and providing the best games for the paying customers to watch.

Despite their injuries the Miners appear to stand up well to the tough going. Their showing at Halifax last night in view of the fact that they had used only two forward lines here the night before was somewhat remarkable. The Miners left here yesterday morning by train at seven o'clock and travelled as far as Truro from where they took the bus to Halifax. "Hub" Macey and Bob Lezer were flown into Halifax from Glace Bay for the game.

When Johnny Horeck said that the Islanders were very tough at home he wasn't just talking through his hat. The Islanders haven't lost a game at the Forum since January 7 when they forfeited 4-2 to the Halifax Saints. Since then they have played eight games at home, winning seven and playing the other to a draw. Their home record will soon be as good as that of the Beavers.

A telegraphic vote of the Big Six Clubs was taken yesterday to decide upon the Sydney Millionaires "unusual help to clubs" appeal for the right to bring in two additional forwards. The Millionaires have asked for the right to make use of the clause on the grounds that they can only dress 13 men for games at home and 12 men for games on the road. The Millionaires have lost the services of Eddy Marinova for the season with a further knee injury. If the Big Six Clubs voted in favor of the Sydney proposal the matter would have to be taken up with the M.A.H.A.

According to Aubrey Keizer of the Sydney Post-Record, referee Frank Elliot of St. Catherine's, Ontario had a pretty tough time of it in Glace Bay last Saturday night. In the third period Elliott handed out penalties to Chorley of the Miners and Bathgate of the Millionaires for slashing and high-sticking. The call was hotly disputed by captains Hub Macey and Don MacLean with the result that Macey and playing coach Bud Mace of the Miners drew misconducts.

When referee Elliot went to the penalty box to announce the penalties, a fan in the front row started walloping the official with a spat rubber. Elliot and referee Mary MacIntyre ordered the fan removed from the rink. Then when MacIntyre went over to point out the fan, the same fan grabbed him by the sweater. In the meantime another fan in the same section tossed water on the referee. Then Elliot gave the warning that any more debris would mean awarding the game.

Moncton Hawks Eke Out 2-2 Draw Verdict With Sydney Money Men

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 5.—(CP)—A late third period goal by Red Olsen tonight gave Moncton Hawks a 2-2 sawoff with Sydney Money Men in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The tie Sydney five points back of Moncton in the race for the last playoff berth, with Moncton seven points back of Halifax and Glace Bay, tied for third.

Fred Hildebrand's first period goal was cancelled by Corey Hamilton's second frame effort. Don Whalen's goal earned credit for the second Mills tally, which Hawks goalie Don Lockhart hauled into the net.

With less than two minutes left in the game Olsen fired the second Moncton goal of the game to give Hawks a split in points.

"The game was dull and ragged in the first two periods, but it brightened up considerably in the third, when each goalie halted 12 shots. During the game Lockhart had to make six more than Cliff Hicks in the Sydney net.

Denis Filion of the Hawks was boarded by big Dunc McIntyre in the first period, and after a brief appearance in the second, quit the game. Full extent of his injuries was not known, although it was learned he suffered a twisted knee.

Wealthy U.S. Dog Racing Promoter Killed By Blast

SAN MATEO, Calif., Feb. 5.—(AP)—A wealthy promoter of dog racing tracks started his Cadillac today and was blown to bits by a thunderous explosion, apparently from a dynamite bomb under the floorboards of his car.

The victim, Thomas A. Keen, 56, had wide interests in dog and horse racing tracks, including Sportsman's Park, Cicero, Ill. Another Sportsman's stockholder, Edward O'Hare, was assassinated gangland style Nov. 26, 1939.

The shattering explosion wrecked the car and garage and blew the engine mounting 25 feet, through a window of Keen's 16-room San Mateo mansion. The mouncing lodged in a ceiling.

Police Chief Martin McDonnell said:

"I assume this is the result of a conflict in business between Mr. Keen and some other group interested in his kind of work."

He did not elaborate.

Keen headed the International Totalizer Company, which manufactured odds-flashing "tote" boards for dog and horse racing tracks. Total bets before races and the amount of payoffs afterward.

Gavilan Ranks Dykes High As Fighter

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Cuban Kid Gavilan today ranked Booby Dykes with Bill Graham, Johnny Bratton, Charles Humez and Gill Turner among his welterweight title contenders.

"He move back like Graham and Bratton," said the Keen. "He no show much fire but was cool and even tempered. Feint and back. Feint and back. That's the way he go. He pretty good fighter, hard to hit."

Gavilan didn't think his second title defence last night was as close as the officials made it. Referee Eddie Coachmen voted for young Dykes of San Antonio but the two judges gave it to Gavilan.

"I give him live rounds to two even," the champion said. "He hit me four good right hands but no hurt me."

The 26-year-old Gavilan revealed he had additional weight problems yesterday to make the 147-pound limit.

"First time I step on the scales," he said, "before the people come I weight 148 1-2. Go to work in the side room. First official time I am 147 1-2. Then I finally make 146 and 14 ounces. I do no work Sunday and eat heavy breakfast."

"I no get tired. But I was a little off. My timing was off. No good fighting for the title without one tuneup."

Want of the future?

"It all depend," he said. "Anything can happen. Maybe I fight two-three years more. I like fight Ray (Robinson) for middleweight title. All my life I confident I can beat Robinson."

(Gavilan tried it twice and lost both times, once for the title when Robinson still was welter king.)

"But I like keep welter title one-two more years."

Oslo Taking On Olympic Games Look

OSLO, Norway, Feb. 5.—(CP)—This city of 400,000 population is shaping up as the world's sport centre with the cream of the globe's winter-sports athletes arriving daily for the Olympics.

Competitors from about 20 of the 30 participating countries are here and 50 of the expected 460 newspaper men and photographers have moved into the newly-built press hotel.

Oslo is taking on the Olympic look. The five rings, symbol of the games, are predominant in store windows and the flags of the competing countries are going up in hotels, shops and other buildings.

Athletes with the "Canada" flash on their shoulders are hobnobbing with Chileans, Frenchmen, Austrians, Icelanders, Italians, Swedes and others at Sogn, the Olympic village in North Oslo.

Sogn is made up of two modern, electrically-heated eight-story apartment buildings which will house the expected 1,200 to 1,300 competitors. There are two beds to a room, a table with reading lamps, built-in cupboards and every floor has two sitting rooms, showers and wash rooms. Work-shops for repairs are located in the cellar. The buildings also have a large restaurant, post and telegraph office and laundry.

Canadians now in the village—skiers and figure-skaters—are high in their praise of the quarters and the food.

The Canadian speed-skaters are at Lohammer, about 70 miles north of Oslo, until Monday. Edmonton Mercury's Canada's hockey team, are making an extended European tour and are not expected until shortly before the games start Feb. 14.

The skiers were out today at the Rodkleiva Slalom course in a northern Oslo suburb and the most impressive was Mrs. Rhoda Wurtelle Eaves of Montreal. Frank Gabl, coach of the Canadian women skiers, said he is confident Mrs. Eaves will be up there with the best in the world.

BOSTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Maurice (Rocket) Richard, Montreal Canadiens' star rightwinger, was sent home today by coach Dick Irvin to undergo further medical treatment.

Richard, who has been suffering from a stomach ailment, returned to action last week after missing seven National Hockey League games. He appeared far below par here Sunday, night when Boston Bruins shut out Canadiens 1-0.

"Richard will not play for us again until he is 100 per cent fit," Irvin said. "Having him play the way he is feeling now jeopardizes Canadiens' playoff chances."

Canadiens entrained here tonight for a Thursday night game in Detroit.

Calgary Stampede Coach To Resign

VANCOUVER, Feb. 5.—(CP)—Hank Blade said last night he plans to resign as coach of Calgary Stampede, cellar team in the Pacific Coast Hockey League.

He told reporters as he stepped aboard a plane carrying him away from a disastrous coast tour that he would like to continue as a player for Calgary "if they still want me."

Halifax Saint Mary's Rock Glace Bay Miners With 5-3 Win Last Night

HALIFAX, Feb. 5.—(CP)—Halifax Saints rocked Glace Bay with a 5-3 defeat tonight to move into a third place Maritime Major Hockey League tie with the Miners. All-powerful on home ice, the Saints, in knocking off Bud Poile's rugged Cape Bretoners averaged the only loss they have suffered at home since they started a first division drive late in December.

Fast, sharp and working smoothly under the guidance of coach Bud Poile, the Miners looked good to make good their promise of again humbling the Saints before the home fans when Anderson scored the only goal of the first period.

But they lost their bearings for the first three minutes of the second period and before they could again get on target, the eager Saints had whipped three goals past Bob Arnel.
