

Re-activated Summerside Area

SUMMERSIDE - An organization begun in Summerside in the late 1800s has been re-activated. The YMCA in Summerside will now be operating on a full scale program by itself as a separate organization apart from the Y's Men's Club.

Summerside YMCA President Keith Lapp stated yesterday that the Y's Men's Club and YMCA in Summerside are synonymous in the public mind and it will be a mistake to attempt to replace the present position which the Y's Men's Club has earned as sponsors of the Y's programs in the town. He also noted that the present service programs of the Y's Men's Club fully occupy the volunteer time contributed by its members and arising from this, it would appear to be unwise to further burden the individual members with additional demands on their time.

Mr. Lapp said the YMCA has actually been in existence within the Y's Men's Club but has not been active. The first year of the YMCA will be financed by assistance from the Y's Men's Club, and the following year Lapp and the committee will be making arrangements for the re-activation of the YMCA as a separate organization.

The National Council is watching the Y's Men's Club experiment with interest, stated Mr. Lapp because it is a small town and the Y's Men's Club is operating without a professional staff. If the program here proves satisfactory it may be introduced in similar towns across Canada.

The Summerside YMCA has appointed Mrs. Carol Carpenter as program secretary for the new venture. Mrs. Carpenter is a native of Toronto and has had wide experience in YMCA work there. She is married to Kenneth Carpenter, a navigational instructor at the Summerside RCAF base. Mrs. Carpenter will act as co-ordinator to get programs started.

The Y's centre will be open after school hours for student activities and possibly all day Saturdays. She noted that plans are underway for the establishing of a "Phin Club", which is a non-conventional club for young women.

Junior Hi-Y programs will be extended and assistance may be rendered to church groups in coaching sports and perhaps forming leagues. The YMCA will act as a co-ordinating body since many church halls are empty on Saturdays and lack coaching leadership in sports.

Mr. Lapp pointed out that Summerside is the only YMCA in Canada where the church appoints their own board members to the executive. Nothing will be done until another P.E.I. pioneering effort. Mr. Lapp said the Charlottetown Y's Men's Club was the first in Canada.

POOL PROBLEM - Summerside YMCA has been contacted by Hon. Hubert MacNeil, M.D. to head up a committee to study the pool problem in the near future, to discuss problems that may exist with the pool and the swimming pool being built at the Vocational School, being used by the YMCA. The two major problems are: They are raising the capital to complete the pool and the method of development after the pool has been completed. The town has offered to purchase the land on which the pool is to be built.

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Rehabilitation Program Aims of John Howard Society

(Editor's note: This is the last in a series of articles concerning organizations taking part in the province-wide United Fund campaign.)

Improving the lot of inmates of jails and penitentiaries and re-establishing them as useful citizens are the major aims of the John Howard Society, judging in the United Fund at \$200.

The society's tasks are to supervise, counsel and rehabilitate convicted men and women; to provide assistance for their families; to press for improved legislation with reference to court procedure and penal administration.

Since its formation in December, 1960, the John Howard Society on P.E.I. has handled over 60 cases, of which less than 12 were juvenile cases. Secretary of the society, Wendell Mackay, estimates that almost one-half

of those assisted become completely rehabilitated. Another area in which the society is concerned includes that of the attention of welfare agencies. They may also do some counselling, and try to determine whether family conditions will be favourable for the man's return.
