

# Aims PC Party Faces Challenge

"It is a tribute to the ability of Dalton Camp, national president of the Progressive Conservative party, and will serve to strengthen our party and, more important, the national political fabric generally," Mr. Macquarrie said.

# New Traffic Control Lights Go In Operation Wednesday

Installation of new type overhead traffic lights is well under way at the intersection of Grafton and Queen Streets. It is expected the new lights will be installed and in operation by late Wednesday, chairman of the Traffic Control Committee, W. R. MacNeill said Monday.

The new lights, said Mr. MacNeill, will be overhead type, and will be suspended above the street. They will be easier seen by drivers than the standard type lights at the street corner. This advantage, said Mr. MacNeill, was the chief reason for installation of the new type lights.

It will also be possible with the new traffic lights for "no turns" to be signalled at peak traffic periods. The lights can be adapted to any system of regulating vehicular and pedestrian traffic that might be used, said Mr. MacNeill.

The lights are being installed on a trial basis for the present, said Mr. MacNeill.

"The devotion to an attitude of service engaged in by individuals and eventually the different types of service permitted the expansion which obtains today. The Rotary movement spread and by 1910 there were 16 clubs in the U.S."
