U. S. Senator Wants Study of Russian Arms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Stuart Symington (Dem. Mo.) asked Tuesday for a Senate study of the relative strength of Soviet and free world military forces.

He said Defence Secretary Wilson has underestimated Communist strength all along and failed to take steps necessary to obtain "adequate arms" for the U.S.

Symington cited an announcement by the defence department that Soviet intercontinental bombers, comparable to the U. S. eight-jet B-52, have been observed in formation flights, and that a Soviet turbo-prop bomber and a new all-weather fighter have appeared.

"It is now clear," Symington said, "that the United States, along with the rest of the free world, may have lost control of the air, except for the possibility we still have advantages in base location and training."
