THE WEATHER.—Fresh northeast to north west winds, fair little change in temperature.

STILL IN PICTOU.—The easterly winds blocked Pictou Harbor with ice and the Stanley was unable to leave for Georgetown to-day.

THE MAILS.—Crossing both ways to-day. The boats left Tormentine this morning at twenty minutes to eight, and the mails arrived in town at 2.15.

MAUD L. WINS.—A horse race took place at Hillsborough Bay, on Friday afternoon. It was won by Maud L., owned by Mr. Neil Livingston, New Dominion and driven by Mr. A. Doull.

WILL LOAN DEALS.—The brigantine Caspian, Captain Wm. Gordon, has been chartered to load hard pine at Jacksonville, Florida. The vessel has been laid up at Taylor's wharf during the winter and will proceed to Jacksonville in ballast.—Halifax Herald.

I. O. G. T.—The meeting of District Lodge to have been held at Pownal on Saturday has been postponed on account of the storm until Friday next at 1.30 p. m. Revs. McConnell, D. B. McLeod, Howard and Spurr and other speakers will address the meeting.

PALM SUNDAY.—Yesterday was Palm Sunday, and the services in St. Dunstan's Cathedral were of a very impressive character. Previous to the celebration of High Mass the blessing and distribution of palm took place, and there was the usual procession. In the evening Rev. A. P. McLellan, rector of St. Dunstan's College, preached an able sermon on "The Forgiveness of Sins." The services were all well attended.

ST. JAMES' HALL.—On Tuesday evening April 11th, the Rev. Mr. Fallerton will lecture in St. James' Hall on "K. K. Larney." This lecture has been specially prepared for the occasion, and will be illustrated with stereopticon views which have been reserved for the lecture and which have not been shown in Charlottetown as yet. The Lakes of Killarney and the Giants Causeway will be the special features, interspersed with music and song.

The details of the information show that for the past seventeen years Mrs. McIntyre and her children have been the subjects of the most cruel and inhuman treatment at the hands of the husband, and to avoid her husband's onslaughts she has on several occasions had to make her escape from the house through a window and seek shelter at a neighbor's residence, clad only in such garments as she could throw upon her in her haste.
