Ch'town Man Elected Lions Dist. Governor

Louis R. Bagnall of the Charlottetown Lions Club was elected district governor at the special district convention held at St. Andrew's, N.B., yesterday. It is the first time a member of the Charlottetown Lions Club has been honored with this post. The districts known as A-N.I. is comprised of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and part of the State of Maine.

Mr. Bagnall will succeed retiring Governor Colin MacKay of Ormococt, N.B.

FIRE KILLS TWO
LIVINGSTON MANOR, N.Y. (AP)—Three persons died and five others were injured early Tuesday when fire destroyed a Catskills Mountain resort, the Waldemere Hotel. One person died of injuries at Loomis Hospital in nearby Liberty, N.Y. Later two bodies were recovered from the ruins of the hotel, state trooper John Bolt reported. Police estimated damage at \$100,000.

Dingwell's Mills Family Flees Flames As Home Destroyed

SOURIS — A fire Monday night completely destroyed the dwelling of Andrew Blaisdell, Jr., of Dingwell's Mills forcing the family of five to flee with little more than the clothes on their backs.

The blaze was noticed at approximately 8:30 p.m. by a passer-by who immediately warned the occupants. Mr. and Mrs. Blaisdell and their three children were in the house at the time.

The fire was believed to have started when a stove pipe which passed through the attic became disconnected in some manner.

All that was saved were some kitchen utensils and a baby's crib. It is not known how much of the loss would be covered by insurance.

Remano Given While Pills Are Investigated

The case of Ernest James Fardy, Charlottetown, appearing before Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday, has led to a question of whether or not nitroglycerine pills are considered a drug under the Criminal Code.

Mr. Fardy, charged with driving while intoxicated or under the influence of a drug, told the court he had taken one of the pills while driving to combat a sudden chest pain resulting from a heart condition. He said the pills had the effect of making him slightly groggy, but that he had been able to drive his car.

He testified that he had had a drink of hot whiskey about five hours previous to being arrested. Mr. Fardy would account for the "slight smell of alcohol" requested by Const. MacKerzie, city police force, at a previous hearing.

The accused was remanded until June 14, pending an investigation to determine the classification of the pills.

Thieves Looting Grounded Tanker

The persons who have been removing items from the grounded tanker Seokook are breaking the law and are nothing but common thieves, Gordon R. Holmes, judge of Admiralty explained last night.

The rights of salvage, allowing the first persons on the scene to claim an abandoned property, do not apply in this case simply because this ship was not abandoned, and that law applies only to the open sea," he said.

"The Seokook was taken to the present resting spot off the Georges Island for the specific reason of getting her away from the city, and the owner has every right to remove her at any time," Mr. Holmes explained.

Earlier in the week, the captain of the ill-fated ship said that persons were removing any and all loose items on board during the night.

He is taking such articles as brass fixtures, rope, blocks and tackle, burnt deck chairs, barrels, and so on," he said.

He also explained that it was not so much the value of the items, which could amount to \$1,000, but that any person boarding the vessel were risking their lives as it could still explode at any moment.
