**APPEALS COURT.**—The City Appeals Court will meet tomorrow (Friday) at ten o'clock.

**SCOTT ACT.**—The vote on the petition for the repeal of the Scott Act is taking place in Charlottetown to-day. The Act, after having been once repealed, was brought into force on the 19th April, 1894, by a vote of 734 to 712.

**ACCIDENT AT KENSINGTON.**—Miss Maggie Shea daughter of Mr. William Shea of Summerside met with a painful accident at Kensington on Monday last. She was standing on the platform waiting for the arrival of the train when the semaphore chain snapped, the recoil striking her on the head and stunning her. She was taken to the residence of the station agent where it was found that her shoulder had been dislocated. Miss Shea was able to return home yesterday.

**LAST NIGHT'S SCOTT ACT MEETING IN THE OPERA HOUSE.**

A fair audience attended the meeting last night and listened to the final address of Mr. Spence previous to the election. The Rev. Mr. Campbell was chairman and made a good speech in opening the meeting.

Mr. Corey led in prayer and Mr. S. F. Hodgson was several times before the audience giving the state of the polls for the instruction of the electors. Mr. Spence's address was as usual clear and interesting. He again took up some very instructive figures and gave the results in Scott Act and license districts touching criminal statistics and each time the Scott Act section had the advantage.

He read quotations from Father Matthew and Cardinal Manning and paid a glowing tribute to the self-denying and successful efforts of the Catholic priests to forward prohibition. He spoke of the fact that while the liquor party had brought forth champions during the Royal Commission, they had not done so in this campaign. He referred to the fact that the liquor party are asking for help from other parts to assist them to get rid of the Act here because it interfered with the business, and they were using the arguments here, that the Scott Act was a failure, and there was more drinking than under free rum. Why do they talk that way? To deceive you into voting out the Act which is the worst thing for the rum business you can get. Yours is a city of homes, and from them must come the future voters to keep up the business. Will you help them to steal your boys to feed their traffic.

Tomorrow vote the traffic out, and hope and happiness and joy will come to many a house of trouble today. A show of hands revealed the unanimous decision of the audience to stand by the Scott Act and vote out the rum today.

Tonight there will be a meeting in the Market Hall where the returns will be given, and addresses delivered. Vote out the rum.
