How many the hunter could carry to the car. Last fall and winter a party of three-hunters of 69 rabbits from the same camp in three trips... a 33, 22 and 14 and then wondered this why their dogs failed to start single bunny. They weren't the hunters visiting this tract approximately 100 acres in extent. I have knowledge of 119 rabbits being taken from this tract during the hunting season 1957-58. About 15 years ago at Fish and Game meeting, I suggested that a daily limit be placed on rabbits of either 5 or 6, was taken very lightly and after the meeting a member asked me if I knew anymore good ones. This winter a number of rabbit hunters have spoke to me being in favour of having a daily bag limit placed on rabbits. One suggested 5 per day and one 6. The sizes had it on this point.
DON'T REALIZE
What a lot of hunters fail to realize is that rabbits are under every predator hunting all the year round. Foxes, hawks, owls, hawks, weasels, ravens, hunting dogs and cats. They kill for sport their masters, although a cat kills kittens will carry home half a dozen grown rabbits gale. Farmers have told me that the morning gaffer hunting dogs had a nighty run in their pods they have found as many as six immature rabbits packed in a pile at wood's edge they are a prolific race. Hunters will have to learn the hard way that there is a possibility of going to the well once too often.

NO COMMENT

Hawks Beat Bruins 4-2; Canadiens Shut Out Leafs

BOSTON (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks defeated Boston Bruins 4-2 Thursday night when Ted Sloan and Ted Lindsay combined for the deciding goal. The outcome marked the eighth straight National Hockey League game without defeat for Chicago.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal's high-riding Canadiens backed up Jacques Plante's sure goaltending with strong firepower Thursday night to shut out tail-end Toronto Maple Leafs 3-0 before 13,825 National Hockey League fans.

Chicago strengthened its hold on second place, moving six points ahead of idle New York in the contest witnessed by 10,751 fans.
With the score tied 2-2 midway in the final period, Bruins defence let both Sloan and Lindsay get free in front of the Boston goal. Don Simmons made one save, but after he was down Lindsay slid a pass to Sloan who fired it into the nets.

The win—Montreal's fifth in seven meetings with the Leafs this season—gave the Canadiens 53 points. The Maple Leafs were left in the league cellar with 32 points, three behind fifth-place Boston Bruins.
