**FOUR IN ARTESIAN WELLS.**

The cities and towns that are not fortunate enough to be near a flowing stream, or so situated as to be easily reached by coal cars, have another source for power, says the Electrical Review. Artesian wells furnish the means, and experiments in South Dakota have shown that they are not only an excellent source of power, but that they are economical and inexpensive to maintain.

Near the city of Redfield, S. D., an artesian well has been furnishing sufficient power to serve the needs of lighting the city. It was originally intended for irrigation purposes, and the cost of its construction was \$3000. Sinking to a depth of 160 feet, the bore of the well is 12 inches in diameter from top to bottom, while outside of this six-inch pipe, extending from the surface down through the drift for a distance of 150 feet, an eight-inch pipe which serves as a strengthening casing. The water comes from a stratum of clear, white sand, and is soft and clean. The flow is 3027 gallons in twenty-four hours, and the entire volume of the water is thrown 16 feet above the pipe. From a two-inch opening the water is thrown 158 feet into the air. The closed pressure of the well is 163 pounds to the square inch, and with a two-inch pipe the pressure is 128 pounds, while with an opening three-fourths of an inch larger it is but 65 pounds.

**HANDESSING THE STREAM.**

With a horse made water wheel 50 horse power has been developed at the Pelton Wheel Company claim that with their wheel at the 21 inch opening the well will be good for 100 horse-power. At the present time the Pelton wheels are installed, and furnish current for the city for both arc and incandescent circuits. The lights are remarkably steady, and there could be little doubt of the success of the experiment, if it may be so called.

One mile from this well is another of smaller diameter, but of equal pressure. The sand formation in which the water is found crops out at the base of the Rocky mountains, and also in the beds of the Upper Missouri and Yellowstone rivers. **Amateur "snappers" in Russia.**

Amateur photographers have made but little progress in Russia. There are not many photographic societies in that country, and one rarely, if ever, hears of a Russian amateur contributing to any of the international exhibitions. I have often wondered why this was so, and have at last discovered the solution of the problem. In this country one is free to go where one pleases and to photograph anything. Amateur photographers thus become a pleasant and fascinating pastime. In Russia, however, things are different.

A gentleman who has resided for years in that country relates his experiences, and from these I gather the following information: It is necessary to communicate with the police and obtain a license before taking a photograph. It is also necessary to be very careful where one is seen photographing. If one happens to be in a restricted area, one is liable to be discovered by the Secret Intelligence Department, he stands a chance of being dispatched on a free excursion to Siberia, where return tickets are not supplied.

**Value of Tele-Photographic Lens.**

There is one phase of the use of these lenses which has not been touched upon, and which will make it of invaluable use for many purposes, says the Amateur Photographer. While giving an immense amount of detail in a distant landscape, it may be made to reveal topography and elevation of the land, and other things which are not visible to the naked eye. For this purpose the two stereoscopic pictures could be separated by from 50 to 100 or even more feet. In this way the detail of the relief of the landscape could be brought out in a very remarkable manner, and by graduating the length of the base line and noting the displacement of the image, it would be possible to measure accurately the different distances of objects, which in an ordinary photograph would seem to be in actual contact. Hills, valleys, positions of trees, mounds, earthworks, etc., can be brought distinctly into view. In size operations and in all work of a permanent character in any unknown country such stereoscopic views would be in the highest degree valuable.

**Electrical Channel Lighting.**

Some experiments have lately been made by the Light House Department on Staten Island, N. Y., in the use of electricity for channel lights. From a dynamo on Sandy Hook wires were run under water and supplied with double row of lights, red on the right and white on the left, entering George's channel in the lower bay. It is said that the experiments in this respect, successful, and electric apparatus has now been introduced into four new light houses to test its reliability and economy.
